Special Committee Has Conference at Capitol

The special legislative committee appointed by Governor Olcott to consider proposed regulatory legislation to be introduced into the special session of the legislature next week for the protection of Oregon highways, at a meeting here yesterday, decided not to make the result of its deliberations public until the legislature meets.

Whether a tentative bill or bills will be drafted for introduction at the special session, or whether only a report will be made, was not decided yesterday. But whatever results come from the committee's deliberations will be released simultaneously to the members of the legislature and to the newspapers for publication.

Syndicalism Case Will Be Heard in Court Today

The case of the state vs. Joe Laundry et al, who are being tried under the criminal syndicalism law, will be heard in the supreme court today. Laundry and associates were convicted in the lower court for Multnomah county and Laundry was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary. The defendants are said to be I. W. W. George F. Vanderveer of Seattle and H. M. Esterly of Portland will appear as their attorneys.

KIAO CHOW IS UNDER DEBATE

Japan Wants Compensation if Railroad is Restored To Chinese

POSTOFFICES MUST GO

Withdrawal of Foreign Stations from China Authorized by Committee

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(By The Associated Press)—Determination of the value of the Kiao Chow railway in Shantung with a view to compensating Japan in case she agrees to restore to China complete control of the road was taken up by the delegates of the two nations today at the resumption of the conversations on the leasehold. Withdrawal of foreign postoffices from China by January 1, 1923, was authorized at another meeting by the Far Eastern committee.

These were the principal developments of today's efforts of the conference to solve the Chinese problem and were considered as bringing nearer a final settlement acceptable to China.

The Chinese were said to regard as highly significant Japan's willingness to discuss the financial basis on which the Kiao Chow railway might be restored. China today made a financial offer, described by a Chinese delegate as "very liberal" and a discussion then developed on the valuation of the road.

According to the valuation made by the reparations commission under the Versailles treaty, Japan would pay Germany 59,000,000 gold marks, a delegate said. This figure included adjacent railway mines and certain other ore fields and formed the basis for today's consideration.

Japanese furnish data Chinese delegates declined to state how near their offer approached the reparations commission's valuation on the ground that their figure would naturally be "subject to change."

The Japanese delegates have agreed to furnish data on improvements and the financial condition of the road and one of the many phases to be discussed was declared to be whether the earnings would be deducted from what China would pay if her offer were accepted.
