BERRY GROWERS CONVENE TODAY

Utility Growers of Willamette Valley Hold Three-day Session

AUTHORITIES TO SPEAK

Program Includes Strawberry, Raspberry, Blackberry and Logan Crops

Over three million pounds of strawberries are produced annually in Oregon, and growers of this fruit realize the value of thoroughly understanding pollination, fertilization and harvesting problems.

Hood River has long been a pioneer in Oregon strawberry culture, and Gordon G. Brown of the experiment station located in that valley will speak at the meeting of berry growers at Salem on December 20, in the offices of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association.

Addresses Booked He will give information on different varieties of strawberries and their yields, and will discuss fertilizer and other subjects relative to growing strawberries. No strawberry grower can afford to miss his address.

Local Growers Speak Wilbur Weeks, a prominent grower of strawberry plants in the Willamette valley, and Ralph Gilbert also of the Salem district will give discussions on growing the right kind of strawberry plants and producing strawberries in the Willamette valley. Salem is becoming the center of certified berry plants and thousands of plants are sent from this district to all sections of the west.

Mr. Gilbert has a large acreage of strawberries and has been very successful in growing them. He has had a great deal of experience in this line and is prepared to come to the meeting to give a great deal of information on strawberry culture.

Governor Urges Vehicle Legislation in Message

Members of the Oregon Legislature: The legislature has been called upon to consider matters which are of such vital importance to the people as to warrant their most careful and undivided attention. I will endeavor to outline them briefly for your consideration so I may cause you no unnecessary delay in forming to action week.

Portland Vote Cited As you know, the people of Portland, representing one-third of the population and taxable wealth of the state, voted by an overwhelming majority to tax themselves in the sum of \$1,000,000 for the purpose of assisting in financing an international exposition to be held in Oregon in 1925.

It is necessary to submit a question to the people, for it is necessary to determine their wishes whether they desire to share in bearing the burden of financing the exposition through revenue derived from taxation. The question of such submission to the people is to come before you, I presume, in submitting such matters to a special election, that the time of the election would be made coincident with the general primary nominating election of May 19, 1922.

Roads in Grave Danger I turn to a matter I deem of paramount importance to the welfare of the state. That is the necessity for additional legislation to preserve our highways from destruction. The weight of loads and speed of motor trucks have created a serious danger to every person who has been interested in the highway situation. Not alone is this a matter of gravity as it affects our hard-earned highways, important as it may be in that connection, but throughout the state lighter types of surfaces, such as macadam and gravel, are being damaged almost irreparably by heavy motor trucks.

Tremendous Saving Possible I respectfully call your attention that more than cover the expenses of this session of the legislature. We are spending millions for roads. We must take proper precautions to protect them from early destruction. To have awaited an other regular session before considering this matter might have meant many hundreds of thousands of dollars in destruction otherwise preventable.
