About the Income Tax—Under the new income law, a man's liability for making a return is based on a gross income of \$5000, provided he is married, and not on the net income of \$2000, according to A. M. Dalrymple, who has been serving for the past three years as deputy internal revenue collector and whose business included that of making out income reports. This is of especial interest, he says, to small stores that sell in excess of \$5000 annually, or the farmer who sells in excess of \$5000 worth of his products. Even if a man doesn't make a dollar, but sells \$5000 or more worth of goods, he must file his report with the deputy internal revenue collector, Mr. Dalrymple said.

He had been conducting a series of evangelistic meetings in Iowa.

New York Scientist is State University Guest
EUGENE, Or., Jan. 4.—On his way to join a scientific expedition with hopes of discovering evidences of the beginning of the human race in the little known regions of Mongolia, Dr. Charles P. Berkeley, head of the department of geology of Columbia university, New York, visited the University of Oregon campus today.

Dr. Berkeley is one of the geologists in the group of scientists who form the nucleus of the expedition which is being financed by the American Museum of Natural History of New York city and by the magazine "Asia."

A sum of \$250,000 has been provided for the use of the party and it is expected that five years will be spent in the research. Representatives of the natural sciences are included in the members of the party, which will attempt to cover every possible feature of the territory.

Wages Are Decreased By Paper Manufacturers
NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—Settlement of the wage dispute between seven large independent paper manufacturing companies and their employees was announced late today by a board of arbitration named to pass on the company's proposals for a 25 per cent reduction.

F. L. Carlyle, president of St. Regis Paper company and a member of the arbitration board, said that the agreement meant an 8 cent an hour decrease for about 10,000 unskilled workers.
