The long night of Pagan persecution was succeeded by the bright cawn of religious liberty, and as our Blessed Savior rose triumphant from the grave, after having lain there for three days, so did our early brethren in the faith emerge from the tombs of the catacombs, after having been buried; as it were, in the bowels of the earth for three centuries.




