The resolution follows: "Whereas, an appeal has been made to the Lutheran Ministerial conference of Oregon for an expression relative to the recent community Christmas tree celebration at Silverton, and the part one of our local pastors took in the event, and"

"Whereas, scruples have arisen as to the appropriateness of a Lutheran pastor's participation therein, and

"Whereas, the Lutheran church does not countenance religious cooperation with divergent confessions, and

"Whereas, we recognize that doctrinal indifference and loose-jointed practices are threatening tendencies of our times, and

"Whereas, the Lutheran church does not countenance religious cooperation with divergent confessions, and

"Whereas, unity in practice is essential to good fellowship among brethren, and

"Whereas, we have no precedent in our church activity which would apply to the situation at hand; now,

"Therefore, be it resolved that it is the conviction of the conference that said community festival was begun and carried out by the association known as the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, who invited our pastor to participate in the program.
