TED THYE MAY MEET LAMBERT IN MATCH HERE IN FEW DAYS

Salem may see a real wrestling match in the near future, that will make them all sit up and take notice.

When Ted Thye of Portland was announced as referee in the Lambert-Kanthe contest at the Grand theatre Tuesday night it was stated that he might take on the winner of the bout. Following the contest, in which Lambert was the winner, Thye announced from the stage that he was ready to make this promise good, provided a suitable purse could be guaranteed. He said privately, following this statement, that there was not much prospect of a good house in Portland, as Lambert was not sufficiently known, but that he would be glad to have the match in Salem.

Lambert has appeared in several matches here, winning all of them. He may not be a genuine world's champion, but he is a powerful, resourceful grappler, with the strength of a gorilla and the endurance of a steam engine, and it's going to take a good man to beat him. In his first match with McClain, he was decidedly not a popular winner, but he has grown in favor with every match, until today he is looked on as almost an "old timer" in Salem. He is an overcast man, and when he was introduced as such to the American Legion smoker, Wednesday night, with the statement that arrangements had already progressed so far that he might meet Thye in Salem within the next two weeks, he got a great hand.

Thye is right at the top of the middleweight class, though he does not claim and could not prove the actual title of champion. He certainly ranks with Walter Miller, Pinky Gardner, Johnny Myers, Pet Brown and Mike Yokel. He is wrestling instructor in the Multnomah Athletic club of Portland. A match of this class ought to draw a capacity house.

BEARCATS OFF TO BATTLE PACIFIC

All Members of Squad Come Through Semester Exams With Success

The plucking squad, otherwise the Willamette university faculty, is understood to be pretty well through with its labors in harrumphing the basketball team. The examinations for the semester, that were regularly scheduled to occur the latter part of next week, have been hurried through for the glee club that left yesterday for a three weeks tour, and for the hoop sharks who also have a good schedule for the last of next week.

It is understood that the ivory hunters failed to find what they feared they might find—some one whom they could tag and say, "You're it!" and take away his sweater and grind his nose on the educational grindstone day and night as penance for some elusive little fact that he had forgotten from the textbook. The students got through with flying colors, it is understood; there wasn't a bobble or a hitch, the book "Larnin" test has passed with a bam and a razz, and the team is able to play in peace once more.

The team goes to Forest Grove today for a non-conference game with Pacific university. Gillette, star forward, who had been ordered by the doc. or to ease up a

little on his playing, will be in the squad, but he will not be worked as hard as heretofore, if at all. Coach Bohler said he might use him in part of the game if needed. The squad comprises Gillette, Logan, Dimick, Doney, Patton, Socolofsky and Caughlan, besides the coach.

A second game, with Multnomah Athletic club, is to be staged at Portland Saturday night. Last year the Bearcats defeated both these teams.

The Willamette freshmen are to have some special attention from now on, with Bryan McKittick, Bearcat star for the past four years, in charge. The frosh have been playing almost anybody and still have a long schedule in sight. They are developing some steady, reliable, if not as yet flashy players, who will be excellent material for future varsity selection.

Four Teams Survive in First Racquet Matches

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 26.—Two New York teams, one from Chicago and one from Philadelphia survived the first round of matches today in the national racquet doubles championship tournament, all the victors winning their contests comparatively easy.

C. C. Pell and Stanley Mortimer, New York, the title holders, defeated Robert A. Gardner and Howard Linn, Chicago, 17-7, 15-9, 15-8; Jay Gould and J. W. Wear, Philadelphia, former champions eliminated Roger Cutter and Hewitt Morgan, New York, 15-7, 18-14, 15-10; F. T. Frelinghuysen and Maurice Heckscher, New York, beat Stanley W. Pearson and Charles Bromley, Philadelphia, 15-7, 15-5, 15-5, 15-4, and H. L. Dixon and E. H. Reynolds, Chicago, won by default from Bulliton Cutting and partner, New York.

ANOTHER PURSE OFFERED CHAMP

Carpentier Seeks Second Match With Dempsey; Prefers London

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—A purse "equal to the one he received for the Jersey City fight, last summer," has been offered Jack Dempsey for a second bout with Georges Carpentier in London in July, Jack Kearns, the champion's manager, announced tonight.

Dempsey's share in the championship fight with the Frenchman July 2, was said to have been \$200,000, the largest stake ever offered a pugilist. Carpentier's share was \$200,000. Kearns said he will announce his decision soon.

The London offer was made by a syndicate of sportsmen, Kearns said. It came on the heels of a message from William A. Brady, expressing his desire to match Dempsey with Harry Wills in London.

Recent talk in the sporting world has included much of a return bout between Carpentier and Dempsey. The theory was advanced that Georges, in a decision bout, would be able to stand off and wait his chance at Dempsey's jaw instead of wading in to quick defeat as he did in Jersey City.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 26.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, declared here tonight that he had not been advised of a reported offer from London that he meet Georges Carpentier there in July.

"Anything that Jack Kearns says goes," said Dempsey. He said that he expected to hear from Kearns, his manager, now in New York, in the morning if the press reports were correct and that Kearns decided that any proposed conditions were acceptable he would be only too glad to meet Carpentier in London for a second match.

Violation of Law Leads To Postponement of Go

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Jan. 26.—Chairman Thomas Bigger of the state athletic board of control, which regulates boxing in Michigan, tonight notified Harry Greb of Pittsburgh that he would not be permitted to box Hugh Walker of Kansas City here tomorrow night, owing to violation of the state law requiring each boxer entered in a bout to be in the city in which the contest is to be held at least four days before the fight. Greb arrived today.

As a result of the ruling, Greb and Walker will meet here next Wednesday night.

Baseball Deal Involves \$50,000 in Cold Cash

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—Cash to the amount of \$50,000 was involved in the deal by which the Washington club of the American league acquired the services of Roger Peckinpaugh, veteran shortstop, Clark C. Griffith, president of the club, announced in an address tonight. Other considerations in the deal, he said, were the transfer of Frank O'Rourke to Boston, which held Peckinpaugh's contract, and Jose Acosta and "Bing" Miller to the Philadelphia Athletics.

Dallas High School to Protest Salem Victory

Information has reached Salem that Dallas high school will protest the victory of the Salem high school in a basketball game at Dallas Wednesday night which Salem won by a score of 13 to 11. The Dallas school has decided to protest on the grounds that the referee, Waldo Zeller of Willamette university, made a technical error which caused a loss of two points to Dallas.

Northcutt Against Cooley Damage Suit Takes Time

The suit of J. E. Northcutt against H. W. Cooley occupied the greater part of the time of the circuit court yesterday. In his complaint Mr. Northcutt, Mr. Northcutt alleges that on September 25, 1920, he bought of H. W. Cooley more than 20 head of cows, that were at that time on a farm near Halsey, for a consideration of \$2162.

He claims the cows were represented to him as of choice milk stock in prime condition and free from disease and tuberculin test-

ed. Also that the cows had been bred to thoroughbred bulls.

The plaintiff alleges that the condition of the cows was not as represented and that he had been damaged to the extent of \$1,000 and that the cows had not been bred as represented, and on this count he was damaged \$200. The plaintiff also alleged that a tractor had been sold him represented to be in good condition, and that the tractor was not as represented and that his damage from this was \$200, making damages of \$1400 asked for.

Skating Championship Is Won by McWhirter

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., Jan. 26.—Roy McWhirter of Chicago won the national outdoor skating championship today with 110 points. Charles Jewtraw of Lake Placid, was second with 89, and Richard Donovan of St. Paul, third with 59. The senior three-mile race was won today by Donovan while McWhirter finished first in the senior one-half mile event.
