Facts About the Catholic Church

(Temporal Power, continued)
The object or advantage of temporal power is not to aggrandize or enrich the Pope. He ascends the papal chair generally an old man, when human passion and human ambition, if any had existed, are on the wane. He is not a young man, not a few dollars a day. He has no wife and no children. He has no family, as he is an unmarried man. The pope is not hereditary, like the sovereignty of emperors or kings, but like the office of our president, is elective, and the holy father is succeeded by a pontiff to whom he was bound by no family ties. What personal motive, therefore, can he have for temporal sovereignty? As the pope was actuated not by a love gain in possessing temporal dominion, neither had they any desire to enlarge their territory, small as it was. The temporalities of the pope were not the fifth the area of the state of Oregon before he was deprived of them by Victor Emmanuel a few years ago. And this little slice of land which Victor Emmanuel wrested from the holy father may be likened to that which the King Ahab wrested from the offending Naboth (III Kings, xli, 3). But the pontiff answers like Naboth of old, "The Lord be merciful to me, and rest in me, give thee the little ewe-lamb which the modern David has snatched from Uriah, his legitimate owner."
The royal shepherd of Piedmont had already seized all the other lambs and sheep of his neighbors; but he was not satisfied till he added to his fold the solitary, tender lamb of the pope. Who knows but the prophesy pronounced by Nathan against David may not also fall upon the modern David and his posterity: "Why, therefore, has thou despised the word of the Lord, to do evil in my sight? Therefore the sword shall not depart from thy house, because thou hast despised me. Behold, I will raise up evil against thee out of thy own house." (II Kings, xli.)

While the patrimony of the pope was large enough to secure his independence, it was too small to provoke the fear and jealousy of foreign powers. The authority of the Roman pontiffs in the Middle Ages was almost unbounded. Had they creased their territory; yet they were content with what Providence had placed originally in their hands.

NOTE—I care say that a few persons in the United States still entertain a fear that some morning the Pope will land upon our shores and take forcible possession. This of course could easily be accomplished (1) for there is about one Catholic in every five or six inhabitants of the U. S., and this overwhelming minority could so easily overpower all non-Catholics, that the prospect is appalling to the intelligent (1) few.
