April 2 Honor Day for Dead Governor Olcott Asked By National Committee to Issue Proclamation

Governor Olcott is requested to issue a proclamation calling upon the people of Oregon to hold appropriate exercises in churches and to toll the bells at a certain hour on April 2 in honor of American soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses who lost their lives overseas and whose remains have been returned to this country, including the last shipment of 1500 now en route.

The following letter has been received by the governor from Mr. Simmons and it is probable that the proclamation will be issued: "Funeral services over the last shipment of bodies from overseas of those American soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses who paid the supreme sacrifice in the World war, will be held in Brooklyn at 3 o'clock, eastern standard time, on the afternoon of Sunday, April 2. As it is intended that the service shall commemorate not only the 1500 bodies new en route but also those of the 44,000 of their comrades who came before and now lie in the soil of their beloved country, we respectfully request and urge that you issue a special proclamation to the people of your state calling attention to the event and requesting that appropriate exercises be held in all churches and that bells be tolled at a given hour." aais iday emfwyp cmfwyp cm
