enable profit from fiber purchased at a high cost and manufactured by high-priced labor have been holding these goods at prices so high that the public will not buy them, and thus with no outlet for manufactured goods now on the market there has been a lack of demand all along the line to the raw fiber itself. The statement is repeatedly made that if normal conditions returned, so that retail sales of flax products were such as to bring about orders from the mills, and a resumption of even two-thirds of the manufacturing capacity of pre-war times, the present supply of flax fiber would not last more than three months. The accumulated supplies of flax products are reported to be gradually becoming exhausted and increasing orders, though in small volume as yet, are being received by the spinning mills. The outlook therefore seems favorable for a good market for flax fiber during the coming year. No reports have reached this office from any source indicating an increased acreage that might possibly overstock the market with flax fiber.

It is too late now to secure flax seed from Holland for sowing this spring. It would be impossible to get it so as to reach Oregon before May. I will endeavor to have some seed of our pedigreed fiber flax that has been developed by 13 years of selection forwarded to Oregon for trial next year unless we have a failure in the increase plots this season as we did last year. The excessive drought in Michigan practically ruined our crop as well as the commercial crop last season. A half bushel of this improved seed was sent to Mr. Crawford for sowing last spring, and a similar amount to Mr. Thomason, but we have received no report from either of them regarding results obtained.

able." "Semenoff!" Colonel Morrow shot back. "Anybody who was in that part of the world at that time knows that he was responsible."

The committee plans to continue the hearing tomorrow when other army officers will be heard. Russian Sends Attorney General Semenoff was represented at the hearing by his attorney, John Kirkland Clark of New York, who announced that he would attempt to have the Russian officer come here to testify. He said also he would ask Colonel Kroupsky, the general's aide and interpreter, to appear in defense of his chief.

General Graves branded the Russian general as a "brutal murderer," and declared he had not regretted one of the crimes with which he has been charged.

**Soldiers Disarmed**  
Colonel Morrow said before he left Siberia in January, 1920, his command had disarmed 4500 of Semenoff's soldiers, adding that had he remained longer, all of them would have been disarmed.

"Outside influence," however, he said, was exerted, preventing the Americans and the Czechs, who were cooperating with them, from carrying out the purpose. "What outside influence do you mean?" Mr. Clark asked. "I do not care to go into that," replied Colonel Morrow, "but I assure you there was the outside influence."

**Shot Without Trial**  
Discussing the "butchery" charges, General Graves recited how at half a dozen points in the interior of Siberia Russians were hauled by trainloads to the "slaughter ground" and shot without trial.
