HARDING THROWS FIRST BALL OUT

American League Opens Record Crowd Attends at Washington Grounds

WASHINGTON, April 12.—President Harding, Vice President Coolidge, members of the cabinet and many others high in official life were in the record-breaking crowd of 25,000 that saw Washington win the opening game of the season today from the New York Yankees, champions of the American league. The score was 6 to 5.

The president was accompanied

by Mrs. Harding and Secretaries Hughes and Weeks.

Other prominent persons who attended included Postmaster General Work, General Pershing (Chairman Lasker of the shipping board, many members of the senate and house of representatives and President B. B. Johnson of the American league. Admiral Cootz, chief of naval operations, directed the flag raising ceremonies which were participated in by both teams, a navy bureau corps, Boy Scouts and high school cadets.

Both Mogridge and Jones were hit hard in the early innings, the two teams piling up a total of 11 doubles, most of which went into the crowd which formed a circle around the outfield.
