ARRANGEMENTS ABOUT READY FOR BIG ATHLETIC CARNIVAL

Arrangements are practically completed for the Military Massacre at the armory Saturday, when Company F of Salem and Company H of Portland meet to fight it all out. They are to shoot, fight, wrestle, run races, parade for the good looks prize, dress and undress against time, play basketball and indoor baseball, and drill under arms; and if they have time they will perhaps roll the bones and spit at a crack—all for the company honor and the \$50 silver cup.

One high class professional boxing bout has been arranged for a 10-round event between Weldon Wing of Portland and George Burns of Aberdeen. These two are among the most successful lightweights on the coast. Wing

won against Mike DePinto at Portland Saturday night, and Burns lost to Lakey Morrow. But both were half-line referee decisions, and tell nothing against either performer. It promises to be a slam-bang event, thought it is not strictly a military event.

The other games come in the afternoon, beginning at 2:30. Two wrestling bouts are to go on at 8 o'clock in the evening between Ellis White of Salem and Day of Portland, heavyweights; and Blankenship of Salem and Daniels of Portland. These are between bona fide members of the two companies. Following this the boxing events will be staged. They are: Keller of Portland, 125 lbs. vs. Ringle, Salem, 130 pounds; Ronning, Portland, 142, vs. Elliott, 140; Helser, Portland, vs. Crossan, Salem, 145; Hughes, Portland, 128, vs. Mason, Salem, 130; Lake, Portland, 140, vs. Frazier, Salem, 150. Sax of Portland, 103 pounds, and Healy, Salem, 118 are both wanted and will be matched against suitable opponents if such can be found.

Street parades are promised at 12:30 and at 6 p.m. The management has put it up to the judgment of the Salem boxing commission, to promise money back to all ticket holders if they decide it's no real fight.

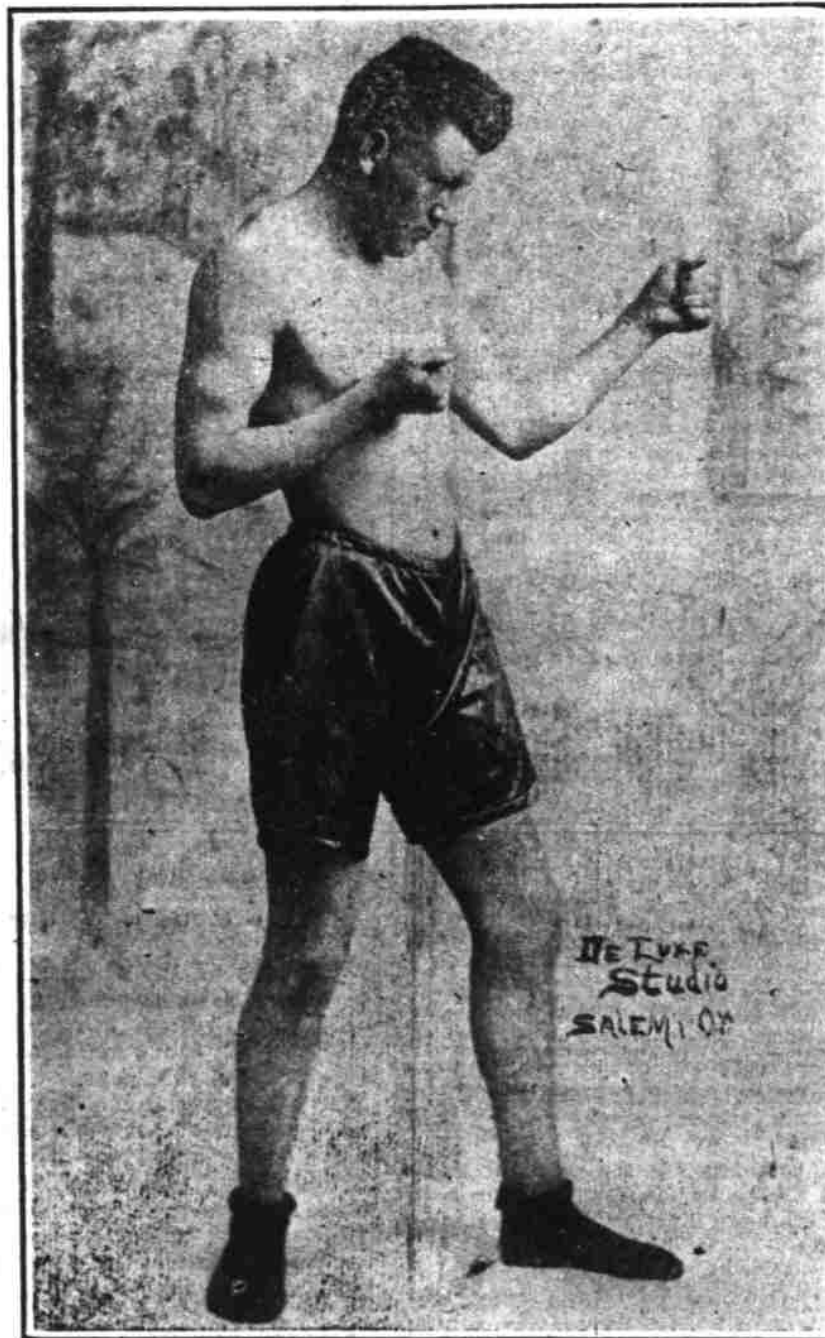

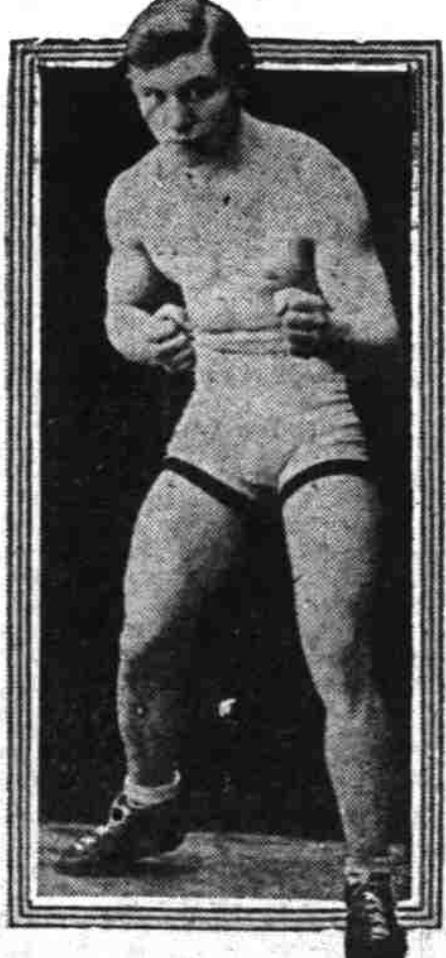
