Production Now Only
4 Per Cent Under Normal

One hundred and thirty mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending April 15, manufactured 79,567,310 feet of lumber; sold 97,198,575 feet; and shipped 86,273,275 feet.

Production for mills reporting, was 4 per cent below normal. New business for the week was 22 per cent above production. Shipments were 11 per cent below new business.

Forty-one per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 39,418,575 feet of which 24,631,972 feet will move coastwise or intercoastal; and 14,786,603 feet will move export. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 1,926 cars.

Thirty-five per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 30,293,275 feet, of which domestic clearances accounted for 15,198,176 feet, and overseas clearances, 15,095,099 feet. Rail shipments amounted to 1,866 cars.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders total 93,545,784 feet and unfilled export orders, 68,390,811 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders total 5,904 cars.

The 15 weeks' production was 1,159,352,577 feet; new business 1,115,559,853 feet; and shipments 1,082,541,225 feet.

Depositors Are Protected
By Special Committeemen

To forestall efforts of shyesters and "hucksters" from swindling depositors in the closed State Bank of Portland is the object of a committee representing the depositors, appointed by Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, and which was here yesterday in conference with Bramwell and Attorney General Van Winkle.

It is said unscrupulous speculators are endeavoring to induce many of the depositors to assign to them their accounts at considerations as low as 10 per cent, and in nearly all cases below 40 per cent. The committee's purpose is to stop this pending efforts to reorganize the bank for which time has been extended by the bank superintendent to May 1.

The members of the committee conferring here today with the state officials are E. B. Barthrop, chairman; Otto R. Hartwig and Sydney C. Graham.

1923 TAGS ARE BLUE AND WHITE

Order Placed With Irwin-Hodson Company By Secretary of State

The contract for furnishing the 1923 motor vehicle, motorcycle and dealers' license plates and chauffeur badges was yesterday awarded by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, to the Irwin-Hodson company, Portland, on the basis of 14 1-2 cents per pair or set for motor vehicle licenses; 39 1-4 cents per pair or set for motorcycle licenses; 26 3/4 cents per pair or set for motor vehicle dealers' licenses; and 12 1-8 cents each for chauffeur badges.

This bid is about 3 1-4 cents less per pair or set than the contract for 1922 license plates for motor vehicles which was let about one year ago to the same company. The Irwin-Hodson company has been manufacturing Oregon license plates since 1916. The award was based on quality and time of delivery, which is a very essential requirement of the contract. There was one other bidder, a Los Angeles company, with a slightly lower bid of 13 1/2 cents, but as Oregon manufacturers are permitted a five per cent differential, the preponderance was in favor of the Oregon bidder. Taking this factor into consideration, with the superior quality of the article or product, the award was made to the Oregon manufacturer.

A total of 130,000 plates will be included in the first order. While a greater number of license plates will be required for 1923 than for the year 1922, yet the cost will be less in the aggregate. Colors selected for 1923 licenses are a dark blue background and white figures and letters.

First Pamphlet Put Out
By Secretary of State

The printing of the first of the 18 separate pamphlets containing the statements of the various Republican candidates for the several state and district offices to be filled at the primary election May 19, 1922, were completed yesterday. It will be mailed to the Republican voters in Baker, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Hood River, Sher-

man, Wallowa and Wheeler counties.

"This pamphlet contains 32 pages and 19,000 copies will be printed," said Sam A. Koser, secretary of state.

"The mailing will be started Monday and continued until completed, which will be immediately followed by the other pamphlets as they are delivered from the state printing department. An additional press has been installed in the printing plant to meet the extraordinary demands upon that department occasioned by the printing incident to the primary election."
