Ralph Williams is Entitled to Another Term

It is evident that Candidate Fithian's platform, like the aged darkey's con trap, is designed to "catch 'em a-comin' and a-gwine." It's anything to catch 'em.

Would you prefer the Glorious Fourth of July to come in the middle of January? Fithian will gladly make the change. Does the law of supply and demand need alteration? Fithian will cheerfully amend it. Are you opposed to the law of gravitation? Fithian will have it repealed.

Are you a farmer? Candidate Fithian loves the farmer. Lots of farmers—lots of votes. Are you a stock raiser? Fithian is fairly hoarse to aid the stock raiser. Lots of you in Oregon, and a stock raiser's vote is always welcomed. Returned soldier? Fithian is the soldier's friend. True, he does not just precisely specify what he would do for you, but he wants you to know he is going to do it. Lots of veterans in Oregon—and election only two weeks ahead!

Candidate Fithian is an estimable gentleman, but his so-called platform reads strangely like the usual pre-election bunk. It doesn't possess even the redeeming element of novelty. That the voters will permit themselves to

be influenced by a few glittering generalities is not highly probable.

The platform of a candidate for Republican national committee can be expressed in less than a dozen words, as follows: "Keep Oregon out of the hands of the Democrats." Reverse the English and you have an ideal platform for a candidate for Democratic committee. Nothing more is asked of a candidate for this office. National committeemen will not be called upon to make law as long as our senators and congressmen are able to sit up and take nourishment—and senators and congressmen are always able to do that. It will be noted that Candidate Fithian carefully refrains from telling us how he would proceed to work his proposed miracle—probably for the very good reason that he doesn't know, himself.

Fithian's candidacy for national committee, at this time, carefully analyzed, practically amounts to this: He wants the office. Probably he does not want it personally as badly as some of his reporters want him to have it. Among these supporters, it is safe to say, will be found disgruntled and the disappointed—those who cherish a grievance against Committeeman Williams because he lacks the miraculous power to provide a job for every itching applicant. And so they raise the shout, "What has Williams done?" To which Williams' friends, and even his fair-minded opponents, reply: "He has done all that a political party can ask or expect its committeeman to do. He has done so much that the national committee has distinguish-

ished him with the office of vice-chairman—an honor never before accorded to a far western state."

The writer of these lines is under no personal political obligation whatever to Ralph Williams. In fact, it has so happened that in past political line-ups of a purely local character, Mr. Williams and the writer were usually on opposing sides. But that any man would be willing, for the mere sake of petty pique or personal revenge, to help tear down a fellow-man who has won to high distinction in the nation through sheer ability and faithful service to his party is beyond this writer's comprehension.

Ralph E. Williams is entitled to another term. He has earned it by meritorious service. When we go into the voting booth a week from next Friday, let us keep in mind this big, outstanding fact: Back in 1916, when the good and kindly Woodrow gave us the walloping of our lives, Mr. Williams led the fight that held Oregon in line as the only Republican state west of the Rocky mountains.

Longest Strawberry Rows Are Seen on Phez Farms

The longest rows of strawberries in the world are out on the Phez Farms No. 2 on Mission bottom north of Salem. They are a full mile long, and they form a single strawberry field of 65 acres. There is another field of loganberries adjoining in the same farm, with 35 acres of the famous Oregon-only fruit. The other Phez farm has more acreage, 100 acres of strawberries and 50 of

loganberries, but the rows aren't so long.

The Phez company in Salem—not the Phez Farms—plans to handle a considerable tonnage of berries this year as heretofore. It will take all the Phez Farms products, and other fruit also for its needs. The strawberries and loganberries that were barreled last year, and shipped east, made a tremendous hit on the market, because of their superior quality and jacking. The same plan will be followed this year.

M'NARY NOT FOR WILLIAMS

United States Senator Re-
pudiates Interview of Re-
publican Chairman Tongue

United States Senator Charles L. McNary in a telegram this morning to Charles T. Early, president of the Fithian for National Committeeman club, repudiates the statement and headlines in a morning newspaper that he had endorsed or was supporting Ralph E. Williams for Republican national committeeman.

Senator McNary's telegram was also a repudiation of the interview of Thomas H. Tongue, Jr., chairman of the Republican state central committee, in which Mr. Tongue attempted to make it appear that Senator McNary was for Williams.

Senator McNary announces in his telegram that he is maintaining an attitude of strict neutrality in the national committeeman contest and also in other Republican contests.

"Washington, D. C., April 26. Charles T. Early, president Fithian club, Portland, Oregon: Have authorized no one to record me as supporting either Mr. Williams or Mr. Fithian for national committeeman. Am taking no part in this or any primary contest in Oregon and I assume no responsibility for interviews issued nor literature published by the adherents of either contestants. I shall retain my neutrality, despite any efforts to involve me in the contest.

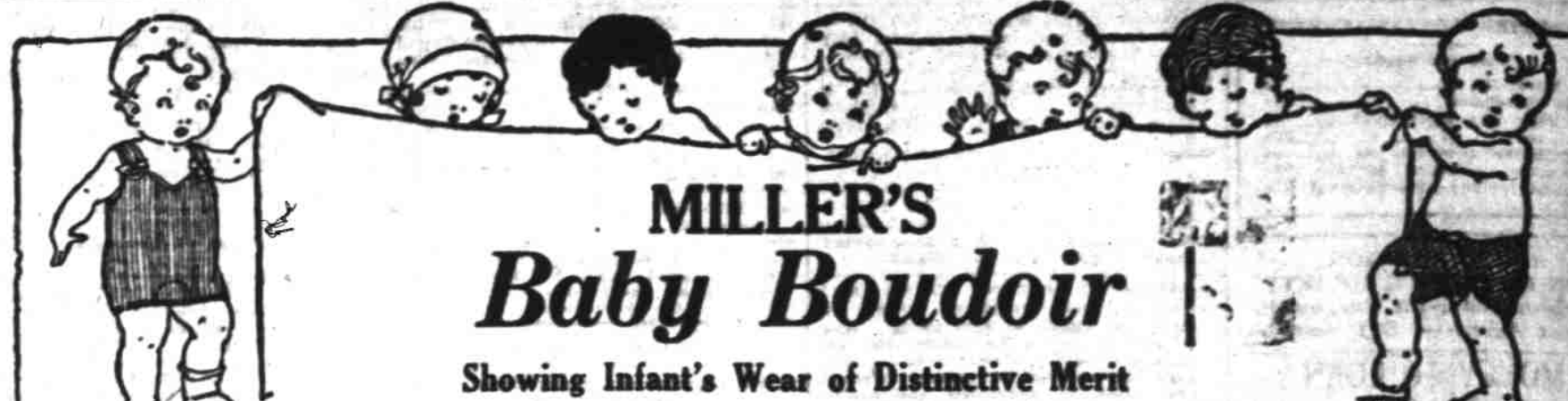

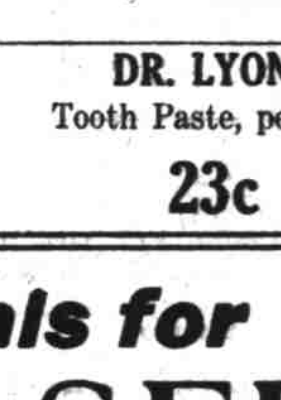

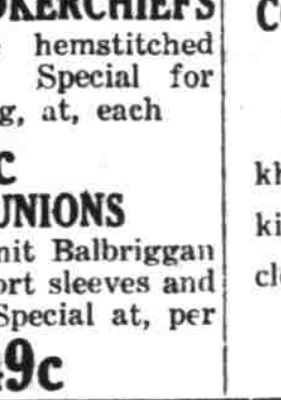
