HALL IS AHEAD OF OLCOTT

GRIFFITH VICTORY CERTAIN

OLCOTT LEADS HALL IN MARION; BROWN PROBABLY ELECTED

Incomplete returns received here at 10:45 o'clock tonight from 24 of the 74 precincts in Marion county indicate that Ben W. Olcott, for governor was leading Charles Hall, his nearest opponent by approximately 300 votes.

The vote for governor, as tabulated from these precincts follow:

Foy Republican central committeeman Ralph Williams was leading O. H. Fithian by nearly 1000 votes.

The vote for this office was: Williams 2941, Fithian 1972.

For representative in congress from the first congressional district, W. C. Hawley was leading Senator Norblad by more than 1500 votes.

The vote for this office was: Hawley 3042, Fisher 467.

For state treasurer Thomas Ryan was leading O. P. Hoff by approximately 400 votes.

The count was: Ryan 1595, Hoff 1060.

For the public service commission Thomas Campbell had a strong lead over his two opponents.

The vote was: Campbell 1360, Layman 492, Thiehoff 741.

For the recall of Fred Buchtel the vote was as follows: Against the recall—1241.

For the recall of Fred A. Williams the vote was: Against the recall—2081.

The vote of the recall candidates follow: Buchtel 1004, McCay 532, Ostrander 426, Williams 1813, Kerrigan 3466.

For labor commissioner C. H. Gram was leading W. A. Dalziel by more than 400 votes.

Gram 1182; Dalziel 741.

For the Democratic nomination for governor Walter Pierce was carrying Marion county by a substantial majority, according to early returns.

Pierce had a lead at 10 o'clock of more than four to one. The vote for Purdy and Starkweather was almost negative. Holmes was second in this contest.

For state senator George Griffith and Louis Lachmund were leading in the early returns.

The vote as compiled from 23 precincts was: Brown 764, Griffith 952, Hubbs 644, Lachmund 849, LaFollette 614.

For representatives T. B. Kay was leading with 1133 votes. Reynolds was second with 952 votes, with Wilson third with 919 votes. Mrs. Fannie Kay Bishop was fourth in the race with 844 votes.

The vote on representative follows: Bishop 844, Bowers 299, Catlin 798, Kay 1132, McMahan 671.

Moore 451, Perkins 118, Reynolds 952, Riggs 450, Taylor 423, Wilson 919. For county commissioner Goulet apparently was leading over Siegmund and Smith. In many of the city precincts no votes with relation to the city contests had been counted at 10 o'clock tonight. From the few reports received indications pointed to a close contest between Birtchett and Moffitt.

COOS BAY MAN HAS EDGE OVER INCUMBENT FOR GOVERNOR AND HOFF HAS MARGIN OVER RYAN

PORTLAND, Or., May 19—For Republican nomination for governor 131 precincts out of 1,729 in the state gave Hall, 4,716; Olcott, 4,227.

For the Democratic nomination for governor 131 precincts gave Holmes, 388; Pierce, 817; Pardy, 323; Starkweather, 674.

For Republican nomination for state treasurer, Hoff, 5,659; Ryan, 3,734.

For Republican nomination state committeeman, Fithian, 4,455; Williams, 4,888.

PORTLAND, Or., May 19—Early returns from Oregon's primary election mostly from Multnomah county, showed Governor Ben W. Olcott and Charles A. Hall of Marshfield leading the field of six candidates. Ninety-three precincts out of 1719 in the state gave Olcott 2,796; Hall, 3,001. Others in the races are Louis E. Bean, 69; J. D. Lee, 145; I. L. Patterson, 98, and George A. White, 297.

The issue between Governor Olcott and Hall, who is a state senator from Coos county, became sharply defined when the Oregon Federation of Patriotic societies placed Hall on a "yellow ticket," of endorsements circulated throughout the state after Governor Olcott in the closing days of the campaign denounced the Ku Klux Klan.

For the Democratic nomination for governor, State Senator Walter M. Pierce, of La Grande was in the lead with 93 precincts reported, with 546. Harvey G. Starkweather of Clackamas county had 442, Will E. Pardy of Marion county 253, and Webster Holmes of Tillamook county, 225.

The fight for Chairman of the State Republican Committee was close, with Ralph Williams, incumbent leading with 3,145 and O. H. Fithian 3,035.

For representative in congress, third district (Multnomah county) C. N. McArthur, incumbent, had a heavy lead in 93 precincts out of 426 in the county. The figures were: McArthur, 2,508; Franklin F. Korrell, 2,499; Maurice E. Crumpacker, 1,607; Stanfield McDonald 351.

Ninety-three precincts gave for state treasurer: O. P. Hoff, incumbent, 3,757; Thomas F. Ryan, 2,496.

Public Service Commissioner: Thomas K. Campbell, 2,465; F. B. Layman, 1,240; J. R. Thiehoff, 3,109.

LANDIS SILENT ON RUTH ISSUE

Baseball Commissioner Only Intimates What His Action Will Be

CHICAGO, May 19.—(By the Associated Press.)—Kenesaw Mountain Landis, baseball commissioner, tonight declared that he would give immediate attention to Babe Ruth's application for reinstatement when it is received tomorrow, but refused to say definitely what action he would take.

"Is there any doubt about what I'm going to do?" he asked a reporter. "Not in my mind," was the reply. "You're going to reinstate him right away, aren't you?" "I'm not going to draw any diagrams for you," said the baseball commissioner. "There's a telegraph wire from New York to Chicago and another one from Chicago to New York. You've told me about Ruth's plans to use one of them, then I use the other one I'll let you know at once."

The judge returned from Louisville today and found "a month's work," as he expressed it, waiting for him. He had little chance to do any hard work, however, for

he was kept busy all day answering queries about Babe Ruth. A moving picture concern wanted him to pose while writing a telegram to Ruth reinstating him—or denying reinstatement—while newspaper reporters and baseball followers kept the commissioner's office full and his telephone continually jangling.

Joe Brooks Again Tries To Get out of Polk Jail

DALLAS, Or., May 19.—(Special to the Statesman)—Joe Brooks of West Salem, serving a nine months sentence in the Polk county bastle for contributing to the delinquency of a minor made an attempt to gain his liberty by sawing a bar through in one of the jail doors. The work, however was noticed by Deputy O. P. Chase and as a consequence Brooks is being confined in one of the steel cells where he formerly had the entire jail as a place for taking exercise.

Just how he managed to secure the saw with which to make the attempted jail break is a puzzle to officers. Brooks several days ago made an attempted get-away when he was being taken to breakfast by Finley Whitney, janitor at the court house but was caught by District Attorney J. N. Helgeson. Brooks has announced on several occasions that he would get out if he had the chance and this is what Sheriff Orr has decided he won't get and he will serve the balance of the sentence in a steel cell.
