"PERSECUTION"

Mr. Buck says for his church, "Her history and life are just what Christ foretold; a constant encounter with hatred, lies, and persecution—the Catholic church alone has suffered." etc. Do they suffer? If so, for what? It is a story to suffer for faithfulness to God, but is it a shame to suffer for crimes committed (1. Peter, 4:13-16). Possibly certain Romanists have been persecuted or "persecuted." We are told that a shockingly ferocious act from Portland is just now "persecuting" the church here in Salem. That too, is a strange and entertaining story. The Jesuit "sect" was founded 400 years ago, and almost the whole period was marked by bitter, unending wars between Jesuits and other "sects" and people of Romanism. In some 70 distant cases, the Jesuits have been driven out of municipalities or nations. Everywhere, always, the complaints against them have been of the same character: Personal crimes, conspiracies against other Romanists and against the civil governments. None of these wholesale "persecutions" of the Jesuits have been by "Protestant governments or people." Jesuit "doctors" expelled them, as did Japan. All the other expatriations have been by Romanists. Are all these other Romanists of the past 400 years—the kings, nobles and people of France, Spain, Portugal, Naples, and other lands, all of them, Catholic? The inflexible pope, Clement XIV, believed the Jesuits guilty, and after mature deliberation, out of certain knowledge and plenitude of power, he did extinguish and suppress the often mentioned society, and take away all its property and its offices, universities and administrations, houses, schools, colleges, hospitals, lands, and whatever places, in whatever province, kingdom or territory they held, in whatever manner they belong to it; its statutes, decrees, constitutions, even though confirmed by oath or by the apostolic see, or any other way. . . . The pope spoke definitely, infallibly, for it was "our holy Lord God, the pope, but he did not actually extinguish the Jesuits; for they promptly extinguished him. Other Romanists have said that Jesuits often did such things. This globe of "persecution" here in America, is different. It is like the other American history Mr. Buck has quoted. And yet such slavish devotion to church dogma has become a bishop's pretension. —JAMES LITTLE
