Jefferson District Plan Rejected by Commission

The state irrigation securities commission yesterday rejected a proposed contract of the Jefferson Water Conservancy district, formerly the North Unit Irrigation district, for development of its 106,000 acre project in Jefferson county.

Objections to the contract were the "cost plus" basis on which the Shattuck Construction company of San Francisco proposed to construct the project, a proposal of Royen & Co., San Francisco bond dealers, to buy a bond issue of \$5,000,000 at 82 cents on the dollar, and lack of sufficient protection in the contract for settlers. A request that the state guarantee interest for five years on the bonds also was objectionable to the commission.
