CALIFORNIA WINS OVER 30 COLLEGES ON HARVARD FIELD

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 27.—Athletic honors winged westward across the continent today when the University of California team again won the 46th annual track and field championship games of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America with a score of 40½ points. Competing in the Harvard stadium against 30 colleges,

including their greatest rival, Stanford university, the well balanced combination from Berkeley rolled up a total of 9½ points higher than that scored by Princeton in second place, and 14 more than Stanford, which finished third.

Cornell, nine times winner of the titular games, was fourth with 211/2 points and the University of Pennsylvania, also a winner nine times, was fifth with 16 points. Following the Quakers came Harvard with 14; Penn State 11; Lafayette ten; Yale 81/2; Columbia 8; Dartmouth 1/2 and nine other colleges with scattering totals.

The calibre of the competition in which California won the championship honors for the second consecutive season is indicated by the fact that three intercollegiate records were broken and two others established in new events.
