Williams Says Service Commission May Make Suplementary Order

Freight rate reductions in Oreon to correspond to the general nation-wide reductions recently made by the interstate commerce commission doubtless will be ordered by the public service commission in the near future, according to Fred A. Williams, chairman of the commission. The Oregon commission now has under consideration the course it expects to

"From a preliminary reading it appears that a general horizontal reduction averaging about 10 per cent has been prescribed in the rates on all commodities, except those heretofore reduced by that amount since the federal increases of August 25, 1920," said Mr. Williams, upon receipt yesterday of official advices from the inter state commerce commission.

Rates Unreasonable

"To use the commission's own words, it has found the freight rates and charges unreasonable on and after July 1, 1922, to the extent that they may exceed the rates in effect August 25, 1920, by specified percentages.

"Through the same proceedings it has been determined 5 3-4 per cent of the aggregate value of the railway property of carriers as constituting a fair return theron on and after March 1, 1922. "In other words, the commis-

sion announces the aggregate net railway operating income which carriers are entitled to earn under that section as 5.75 per cent of the aggregate value of their properties.

Income Taxes Deducted "It is pointed out that inasmuch as the income taxes of carriers are deducted before the determination of net railway operating income, the return fixed is the approximate equivalent of 6 per cent before such deduction.

"The findings just reported after dealing with features of property value, revenues and expenses, efficiency and economy in operation, maintenance, etc., has devoted space to special discussion of the commodities of coal and coke, iron, steel and ore, road and building materials, forest prodcts, agricultural products and livestock, packing-house products. fertilizers and fertilizer materials waste materials, petroleum and products, roofing slate, groceries, milk, cream and dairy products, paper and paper products, cotton seed products, vegetable oil

No Order Made

"It may or may not be significant that no order is made, but the carriers are required to advise the commission not later than May 31, 1922, if possible, whether the findings will be car
