## PROGRAM IS ARRANGED FOR SATURDAY AUTOMOBILE RACES

The same cars could make it from 10 to 30 per cent faster on a well-banked board track.

## Big Lumber Shipments Going to Japan Trade

DALLAS, Or., June 1.—(Special to The Statesman)—The big mill of the Willamette Valley Lumber company of this city has been busy for the past several days getting out a large order of lumber for export to Japan.

The company has been receiving an average of 120,000 feet of logs daily from the camps above Black Rock and this amount will be increased steadily until about 260,000 feet daily is received.

In addition to the large lumber orders being gotten out the company is operating a shingle mill and a box factory which are both working overtime getting out big orders of material both for local and foreign shipments.

The mill is working one of the largest forces of men in its history in an endeavor to catch up on large back orders which were received when the mill was forced to close down a few months ago on account of snow in the logging camps.
