COACH BOHLER IS

AT WILLAMETTE U.

Coach Roy Bohler of Willamette University plans to leave today for Pullman, Wn., to take a summer course in teaching athletics. The Pullman course is to last for six weeks. While the formal election does not come until the meeting of the board of trustees, next week, the day before the annual graduation exercises, it is pretty well understood that Mr. Bohler is to stay on.

The past year has been trying to Willamette athletics, in the loss of the gymnasium and the confusion incident to carrying on a campaign without adequate quarters.

Enthusiasm Not High
It has been difficult to coax or drive students into training when the facilities are so inadequate. Only the genuinely interested ones have been able to stick it through and get anything out of the season. Where there should have been two, or five or ten, aspirants for each sport, there has been one. Where it should have been easy to arrange for the many with an adequate physical equipment right on the university grounds, it has been time-wast-

ing and discouraging to work with the few under the conditions that have existed.
Gym Accommodations Likely
It is confidently expected that the board of trustees, that meets next week, will find a way to provide adequate gymnasium accommodations for next year, and that the Bearcat spirit will blossom out into an amazing crop of athletic enthusiasm. Coach Bohler is looking for a good season. A number of promising lads from the various state high schools, delighted with the spirit they found in Willamette at the basketball tournament last winter, are planning to register here in the fall, believing that they will find here just what they want.

Ross Special Racer is Bought by Larry Hofer

Larry Hofer has bought the Ross Special car that was wrecked at the state fair track last Saturday and has given up the Larlee Special car built by himself and Lee Eyerly, as part of the trade.

The Ross car has actually cost Jack Ross, the present owner, \$4800, according to his statement of values. It has a powerful engine that at top speed develops 120 horsepower. And top speed is a good deal of a top. The owner has driven the car at the rate of 96 miles an hour. It is of larger displacement and power than most of the speedway cars; more power is required for the dirt tracks, such as this one has raced on. JAMES DUNN
PASSES AWAY

One of Chief Owners of Cleveland Baseball Club Dies in Chicago

CHICAGO, June 9.—(By the Associated Press.)—The body of James C. Dunn, one-time a country boy, who rose from an obscure position as a bank messenger to that of one of the chief owners of the Cleveland American league baseball club and partner in one of the biggest construction firms in the country, will be sent to Marshalltown, Ia., his home town, tomorrow night for burial at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Accompanying the body of the baseball magnate who died at his home here this morning after a lingering illness, induced by an attack of influenza last winter, will be three cars of admirers of the sportsman, headed by Ray Johnson, president of the American league and for many years an intimate friend of Mr. Dunn.

The body lay in its casket, covered with flowers, dozens of wreaths being sent to Chicago, although burial will be in Marshalltown. Mrs. Dunn, the widow, today received many telegrams and messages of condolence, all speaking in the most praiseworthy terms of the late Cleveland club owner.

Mr. Dunn's life was typical of the self-made man. From his work in the Marshalltown bank when 14 years old, he entered the construction material business and later railroad construction, being the builder of the Cleveland belt line. He carefully saved his money, although noted for his liberality, and became wealthy.

To thousands of sports followers he was known as "Sunny Jim" because of his amiable disposition and almost constant smile. He was 56 years old and is survived only by his widow.
