

FINE NEWPORT NAT RUSHED FOR SEASON OF PRESENT SUMMER

Newport by the sea, the wonderful playground at the coast for the middle and upper Willamette valley is receiving its usual share of vacationists and pleasure seekers now and has been caring for them for several weeks.

The new natatorium is being rushed to completion. The old building burned down last winter. Rather than lose to the coast's guests that great attraction, a stock company was formed and now nearly every resident of the seaside city owns part of the nat. Its cost is \$30,000.

It will have a bigger, better and deeper swimming pool, shower and tub baths, lockers and dressing rooms. Wool bathing suits and towels will be furnished patrons of the nat. Officers of the Natatorium company are C. O. Hawkins,

president; B. F. Baker, vice president and manager; George Ashcroft, secretary; George Wilcox, treasurer; L. H. Payne, and A. L. Thomas, directors.

W. H. Evans, formerly of the Portland Hunt club restaurant, has opened a grill room facing the ocean. He plans to conduct a high class restaurant. A dance pavilion over the grill will face toward the beach also. The famous Bi-Ho-De-Mar orchestra has charge of the dance pavilion and will be open afternoons and evenings.

Hotels Remodeled

The Abbey hotel is being repaired and made ready for the summer season. Mr. and Mrs. Abbey spent the winter in Portland and San Francisco and are now ready for the tourist season.

The Gilmore, formerly the Cliff House, will open with the usual accommodations. The hotel has been remodeled and refurnished. B. Meger of Portland has purchased the Nicolai hotel and has remodeled it from top to bottom. The Nicolai has been closed for two seasons and is now opening with all new furniture and has been completely renovated throughout.

Chris Arms of Salem is operating the Sea Crest cottages this year. Mr. and Mrs. Arms spent the winter in California inspecting beach resorts.

Cottages Are Plentiful
Newport is considered to have more cottages than any other resort in the state with better natural facilities and will undoubtedly attract more than the usual number of Salem families this season. In addition to other conveniences offered to those spending the season there is that of having a local bank which caters to tourists.
