

Big National Convention to be at O. A. C.

The fifteenth annual convention of the national home economics association will be held at Corvallis August 1 to 5. The leaders selected O. A. C. for its many advantages and in recognition of the advanced work accomplished in instruction and extension at the institution.

The program has been arranged to interest especially housewives, vocational and other teachers, extension leaders and workers, institutional managers and social service specialists.

L. S. Hawkins, director of educational work, United Typothetae of America, is one of the national celebrities selected as speakers. Some others of note, aside from the Oregon people, are the following:

Florence J. Ward, extension worker for women, United States department of agriculture; Dr. Caroline Hedger, S. Arnes Bonham, educational director and author of Boston; Lucy A. Studley, assistant professor household management, University of Minnesota; Harriet E. Vittum, Northwestern university settlement house, Chicago; Mary Brooks Picken of the women's institute of domestic science, arts and science, Scranton, Pa.; L. Ray Balderston, Teachers' college and author of New York; Edith M. Barber, director of Syracuse home bureau, Syracuse, N. Y.; C. F. Langworthy, chief office of home economics, United States department of agriculture; Katherine Phillips Edison, industrial welfare commission for state of California; Mary Anderson, chief of women's bureau, Washington, D. C.; and Margaret Ebbitt, assistant manager of Congress hotel, Chicago.

This is the first time the national home economics association has selected any place west of the Mississippi river for its annual conventions.
