**Abbey Opens Dining Room**  
"The Abbey opened its dining rooms earlier than usual. The other hotels are all running, and the Agate Beach Inn will open earlier this season, the management has built a model seaside tourist park, with camping privileges, running spring water, fuel and electric lights all for 50 cents a day right down on the beach.

"Newport under the leadership of the community club is renovating and rebuilding and painting until labor is at a premium. The deepsea fishing boats are already taking out excursions, and there is abundance of fish and clams at low prices and the fattest and finest oysters that ever were offered the human palate.

**Improvements Many**  
"Improvements are the order of the day on South beach, and

streams of visitors come and go from Alsea bay country. Mrs. W. P. Lord has improved her summer home at Seal Rocks by adding a fine rock-built fireplace and expects to entertain visitors from the Atlantic coast.

"The Salem colony at Agate beach will be on the ground early and fine improvements are being made. The A. N. Bush Jr. beach house is having its own water service built and other cottages will dig wells and put in pressure tanks. A number of fine gardens and flower beds are in evidence.

**Good for Children**  
"The Newport beaches are the ideal place for young people and children. A month or two at the ocean should be the privilege of every growing child. They become rugged and go through the rest of the year without any of the afflictions of childhood.

"The \$15,000 natatorium and dancing casinos are ready for the crowds and better equipped than ever before. Newport will be by all odds the most attractive seaside resort in western Oregon in my opinion, and equally accessible by fine trains and good roads."

# FRIENDS HAVE UNITED PLANS

### Program for Ensuing Year Adopted at Newberg Without Discord

With almost perfect unanimity, Oregon yearly meeting of Friends, in session here, has adopted its united program for the ensuing year, by which the evangelistic and church work of the yearly meeting will be pushed with unusual vigor during the coming year, and the yearly meeting will unite in the work of the home mission and foreign mission departments of the five years meeting, the National Friends organization.

**Colleges Show Growth**  
The department of education has been before the yearly meeting this afternoon with reports from Greenleaf seminary, Greenleaf, Ida., and Pacific college, Newberg. The annual reports of Pacific college show the largest attendance in the college's history, the largest financial resources and the greatest progress toward complete recognition of any year in the history of the institution. The educational address was given by Dr. W. C. Woodward of Richmond, Ind.

The college is moving as rapidly as possible to meet all requirements for standardization. New library and laboratory equipment have been ordered, and additional teachers are being employed.

The morning session was devoted to the cause of peace and the work of the American Friends Service committee. Dr. Woodward gave the address on the latter, showing, convincingly this part of the overseas work of the denomination. In the peace program Cecil E. Pearson and Cecil F. Hinshaw gave the orations which they gave in the two state oratorical contests in which they represented Pacific colleges this year.

## University Student to Manage Dallas Warehouse

# PEEPS INTO TENT AND GETS HURT

### Show Employee Knocks Out Citizen Who Wants to See Girls Dress

DALLAS, Ore., June 17.—(Special to The Statesman)—John Snodgrass, chief of police of McMinnville, and Fred Patterson, deputy sheriff from the same place were in Dallas yesterday looking for an employee of the Howe London shows who severely injured Millard Cook of that city

in an affray while the show was in progress Wednesday night. Cook and a number of other men and boys were peeping into the dressing rooms of the show girls when they were requested to depart by the show management after they had cut a slit in the tent. The management tried to find an officer but none could be found, so some of the employees were stationed to watch the tent. Cook, who had been drinking, according to the McMinnville officers, refused to depart and in an altercation was knocked down by a show employe and hit his head on a tent stake. The employe was later arrested and taken before a

justice of the peace where bail was fixed at \$50.

Thursday morning Cook's injuries were found to be of quite a serious nature and a warrant was issued for the circus employe's arrest. His name however was not taken at the time his bail was fixed and upon the arrival of the McMinnville officers in Dallas with the John Doe warrant the man had left the show, with which he has been working but a few days and departed for parts unknown, without drawing what pay was coming to him. The show management did all possible to help the McMinnville officers catch the man but up to the time

the circus left for Portland his whereabouts was still unknown.
