

The Republicans counted on returning 45 of their 57 seats in the Dail and both sides contemplated a diminution of party strength through the candidacy of independents, especially in Dublin city and county, where the treaty section appeared as likely to be affected as the Repub-

New Angle Seen

Attention is called here today o one point in the transitory provisions of the text of the new co-n stitution which hiherto has escaped comment, but which it is believed must have an influence on the future situation. Under the treaty the provisional government was to terminate within 12 months of signature of the treaty and it was generally assumed that the parliament which is being elected could not have more than a six-months lease of life. In the constitution text, however, it is provided that the government has been finally passed, with this important difference, that once the constitution is passed, all members of the continuing parliament must take the oath of allegiance to the king.

# MORVICH LOSES TO WHISKAWAY

Successor to Man O' War May Have Chance to Even Up Next Saturday

NEW YORK, June 17 .- Morvich, hailed as the successor of Man O'War, met his master today in Whiskaway, a colt he defeated last year. It happened in the Carlton stakes at Acqueduct before a monster crowd that was amazed to see Benjamin Block's wonder colt trailing eight lengths behind H. P. Whitney's entry at the finish.

Whiskaway eased up, came within four-fifths of a second of tying the American record for the mile, taking the lead at the barrier, retaining command all the way and finishing in 1:36 2-5. It was Morvich's 13th start, but the track followers disregarded the superstitious digit in explaining the upset. There is much significance in the fact that the winner carried only 108 pounds to Morvich's 123.

Two weeks ago the Carlton was hailed as a meeting ground for Mervich and Snob II, then believed to be his only rival, but the latter was humbled in the Belmont stakes by Pillory. The Preakness, winner a week ago, was a poor third today, fighting hard five lengths behind Morvich. both legging the same weight. Horologe was always outrun, and June Grass and William A. were

"To prohibit aliens not eligible to citizenship under the United States laws to acquire, possess, enjoy, transmit or inherit real property or interest therein in Oregon, except as prescribed by any United States treaty now existing. Any company, association or corporation of which a majority of the members or owners of a majority of the stock are aliens, other than those excepted above, are classed as prohibited aliens. And real property of interest therein acquired, possessed, enjoyed, transmitted or inherited in violation of this act shall escheat to the state, making conspiracy to transfer in violation of this act punishable as crime,"
