NEVER AGAIN IS ASSERTION OF BABE RUTH, SUSPENDED

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 21.—(By The Associated Press)—Babe Ruth has been banished from the game for the last time for arguing with an umpire, especially over a decision rendered against another player, the champion home run slugger declared here today.

Previous to today's game between New York and Cleveland, Ruth walked into the umpire's room at Dunn field and made that announcement to Umpires Bill Dineen and Dick Nallin.

Is Out Five Days.

Ruth is under suspension for five days, three for wrangling with Umpire Dineen over a decision rendered in Monday's game, for which he was ejected and two for an argument with Dineen yesterday over his first suspension.

When he entered the room Ruth was not in the least antagonistic nor was he excited. If anything he appeared repentant but he offered no apology.

"Bill do you think I am getting a square deal?" Ruth asked Dineen as he sat on a table. He

had just finished practicing with his team.

Dineen Not Responsible.

"I haven't nothing to do with that at all," Dineen replied. "When a fellow is down and out, it seems to be a case of holding him down," Ruth stated.

"Well you can bet its the last time I ever will be suspended for wrangling with an umpire. In the future I will keep out of the argument especially if they involve another player."

Likes To Play.

"I do not regret being out of the game because of the money it costs me. I really don't need the money but I do love to play ball. For that reason it hurts when I can't get into the game."

"Another thing that hurts is the criticism. Some persons are saying that I welcome the suspension because it gives me an alibi for not equalling my home run record of last year. That is ridiculous as I realize that is impossible. Others claim I have a 'swelled head.' My friends know different."

"I want to be in every minute because I love to play baseball."

GRAND JURY PRESSES CASE

Subpoenas Sent Out for Witnesses in Investigation of War Frauds

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Subpoenas have been sent out by the special war frauds grand jury to officials of leading banking corporations in New York, Philadelphia, New Orleans and Jacksonville, Fla. It became known today, requiring their appearance in connection with the investigation of the contract under which the government disposed of its surplus lumber after the war.

All Records Ordered

Heads of the banking firms and their cashiers were ordered to produce all records of transactions made or involving J. L. Phillips, chairman of the Georgia State Republican committee, who is at liberty on \$25,000 bail under charges of conspiracy to defraud the government through the lumber contracts.

RESERVE BANK REDUCES RATE

Drop of Half Cent Causes Little Surprise—Bank of England First

NEW YORK, June 21.—Announcement after the close of business today that the local federal reserve bank had reduced its discount rate from 4-1-2 to 4 per cent, the lowest rate since December 1917, occasioned little surprise in financial circles.

Such a course was vitally foreshadowed last week when the Bank of England, still the arbiter of the world's money market, cut its discount rate to the lowest since January 1914.

Within the past fortnight reserve banks at other centers have sought the approval of the board at Washington for lowering their rates of discount and interest because of the cheaper quotations for funds in the open market.

JURORS VISIT TRAGIC SCENES

Judge Shank Compelled to Reprimand Members for Free Expressions

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 21.—Court, jurors, attorney and defendant in the second trial of Mrs. Madalyn Obenchain for the murder of J. Belton Kennedy passed today visiting scenes connected with the tragedy. The monotony of listening to repetitions of testimony at these places which had been given at the previous trials of Mrs. Obenchain and Arthur C. Burch, her co-defendant, was varied by an altercation between Judge John W. Shenk and a juror, followed by a sharp warning to the jury not to discuss the case or express opinions on any phase of it until it had been submitted to them.

CAPTURE OF SUN ENDS CANTON RULE

Former South China President Now Prisoner on Cruiser Haichi

PEKING, June 21.—(By the Associated Press)—President Li Yuan-Hung today declared that he was prepared to invite Sun Yat-Sen, former president of the South China Republic, who has been taken prisoner by United China forces, to come to Peking to help in the re-unification and reconstruction of the country.

Mount Angel Girl Tries To Take Life by Poison

PORTLAND, June 21.—Marie Marie Zolner, 18 year old Mt. Angel girl, is in St. Vincent's hospital following her attempted suicide Monday evening. A note addressed to a man residing in Milwaukie accused him of having driven her to take her own life.

Woman Given Twenty Years for Murdering Husband

PARIS, June 21.—Madame Marie Louis Bessarabo, writer of feverish verse and sensational stories under the name of Hera Miratel, today was convicted of the murder of her husband and shipping the body away in a trunk, and was sentenced to 20 years hard labor upon a confession made in open court by her daughter, Paule Jacques, tried jointly with her, but acquitted.

MEX PET EARNS ENORMOUS SUM

Subsidiary of Pan-American Company Nets Profit of \$12,540,684 in Year

NEW YORK, June 21.—The Pan-American Petroleum and Transport company, whose large subsidiary, Mexican Petroleum, has been a recent leader in the stock market, earned net profits of \$12,540,684 in 1921, or about 26 per cent on its outstanding stock, said the annual report made public today.

Mexican Petroleum was chiefly responsible for the showing. Its net profits for the year being \$25,151,521. Current assets of \$26,410,395 compare with liabilities of \$10,505,300. The gain of Mexican Petroleum, it is explained, results mainly from the company's more intensive campaign of development.

PRO-TREATY CANDIDATES FAVORED IN IRISH VOTE

DUBLIN, June 21.—Ten seats for the new Dail Eireann remain to be filled, two in Kildare and Wicklow and eight in Cork; these are not likely to be announced until tomorrow.

The figures for the 118 seats already announced are: Pro-treaty 55; Anti-treaty 33; labor 15; independents 6; farmers 5; trinity college members 4.
