The Grants Pass irrigation dis- trict in Josephine county is mak- ing remarkable progress and is now delivering water to about 50 per cent of the acreage under its gravity division, according to Percy A. Cupper, State engineer.

who returned from an inspection of the district yesterday. The district embraces about 13,000 acres and 4000 or 5000 acres is now under irrigation. plant and equipment, according to Mr. Cupper, are probably the most modern in the west. This consists of two large pumps con- nected directly to turbines which are operated by a fall created by a multiple arch concrete dam. The dam is equipped with a num- ber of large gates which can be raised or lowered by hydraulic cylinders, thereby raising or lowering the crest of the dam by approximately 10 feet.
