Bank of Jacksonville
Will Declare Dividend

Checks covering the first dividend to be declared by the state banking department for creditors of the Bank of Jacksonville, which failed August 10, 1929, are being prepared by Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, and will be distributed July 1. They will go to about 400 creditors and will total approximately \$12,000. The dividend will be 5 per cent, and it is the first that has been declared since the bank failed.

As a result of the failure and the investigation that followed, W. H. Johnson of Jacksonville, president of the bank, is serving a 10-year sentence in the state penitentiary, having been convicted on a charge of making false reports, and R. D. Hines, vice president, is on parole with a three-year sentence hanging over him upon conviction on a similar charge.

Supreme Court to Break
Precedent in Hearing

The supreme court of Oregon will deviate from all precedent on July 10 by taking original testimony in a case under argument. This will be the case of the state ex rel. against George Estes, against whom disbarment proceedings have been instituted by the grievance committee of the Multnomah bar association. Estes is charged with defrauding clients.

At the same time the court will hear the case of Estes against Albert Ridgway, secretary of the grievance committee, in which Estes accuses Ridgway of subornation of perjury in the case of Henry Kruger of Columbia county.

The supreme court denied Estes' motion for an extension of time.

BIG SIX CHRISTY
STAGES COMEBACK

Idol of Thousands Again
Takes Mound But the
Wing Was "Cold"

SARANAC LAKE, N. Y., June 28.—"Big Six" Christy Mathewson, idol of the baseball fans the country over, for the first time since he came here three years ago, his life despaired of, walked out to the mound today, wound up and tossed a perfect strike across the plate, while thousands who had gathered for the occasion, cheered themselves hoarse.

Fully 2000 persons including friends of the great pitcher who come up here to see for themselves the fruits of the great fight against tuberculosis that Matty had waged and won, crowded the field. He looked well and gave no signs of having been through his recent illness.

After a procession headed by a band, players on both teams that opened the season, local officials and fans had escorted Matty, his wife and Christy, Jr., piloting the car, in which they rode to a point behind the home plate, Matty left the machine and to the lusty cheers of the crowd, walked slowly but very firmly to the mound. There he straightened to full height, raised the ball aloft, partly wound up and then rubbed his shoulder—he had been sent in "cold."

As he tossed the ball to the catcher, an ovation was accorded him that continued until he had returned to his car and was driven slowly to center field, where he watched the game.

BISHOP TELLS OF
CONDITIONS EAST

Salem Merchant Finds Indications of Better Business
In Near Future

C. P. Bishop, head of the C. P. Bishop company, manufacturers and clothiers, has just returned from a six weeks' business tour in connection with attending several important annual national conventions.

Going direct to New York, Mr. Bishop first attended the National Manufacturers' association, of which his firm is a member; from there the following week to Philadelphia, attending the National Foreign Trades conference. In attendance upon these conventions Mr. Bishop came in intimate contact with a great many prominent business men and manufacturers of the United States. He found them hopeful for the future, and while business throughout the east was not so the rush, yet everyone seemed to be doing something, and with prospects of a good crop for 1932 and a general improvement of conditions more prosperous times are anticipated soon.

On Mr. Bishop's return via Los Angeles, he represented the Salem Rotary club, at their international convention held in that city.

Mistlands Sell Selves
Says Portland Wholesaler

"We just lift the lid of those boxes containing the Mistland prunes and they sell themselves," said J. H. Luhn of the Seely Dresser company, one of the largest retail grocer establishments of Portland, who visited the office of the Oregon Growers' cooperative association Wednesday and placed a large order for the 1932 pack.

"We sell four or five times as many prunes as we formerly sold

of other packs, and this year we are increasing our order 25 per cent over that of last season," continued Mr. Luhn.

Manchuria, Siberia, Japan, the Philippines, and many other distant markets are pleased with the Mistland brand of Oregon prunes because they are the best, it was stated. Riverside drive in New York City, one of the most exclusive residential districts of that city, considers this brand of Oregon prunes as representing the highest quality and now uses it in preference to all others, according to Mr. Luhn, who also stated that the fruit does not have that dead lifeless color but possesses a bluish which is very attractive in packed condition.

HARDING CALLS
STRIKE MEET

Government Report Demanded, But no Answer Is Made by Rebels

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Invitations went out from the White House today asking the leaders of the striking miners and the representatives of the employing coal operators in both the bituminous and anthracite fields of the United States to meet President Harding Saturday "to devise methods upon which negotiations for the settlement of the coal strike can be initiated."

The communications made evident that careful and competent discussions with spokesmen on both sides of the industrial struggle had preceded the meeting call and prompt and ready acceptances are expected immediately.

Union Accepts Invitation

John L. Lewis, chief of the United Mine Workers, who remained in the city after a personal interview with the president, accepted at once in behalf of the union.

The wording of the president's message was interpreted as demonstrating the desire of the administration to hold the meeting above the controversies which have deadlocked the unionized section of the industry since April 1. Official, but informal comment emphasized it was the intention that the conference be held merely to discuss ways and means for a settlement and not to take up the miners' demands for continuance of war-time wage scales, nor the operators' demand in the bituminous field for separate district wage agreements supplanting the semi-national wage contracts that have heretofore been made.

President May Have Solution

It was fully expected, however, that when the meeting assembled the president or his cabinet members who have participated in the preliminary efforts would have a program for continuation of the settlement attempt to present to the assemblage.

There was no hint however as to the line such a program might follow. Secretary of Labor Davis, who has conducted the negotiations with the union for the government, gave the first news of the action contemplated after a prolonged conference today with the president and official copies of the invitations were given out later.

JOINT CONFERENCE JULY 6

PITTSBURGH, June 28.—The Pittsburgh Coal Producers' association, in a letter sent to Dr. Clifford B. Connelley, state labor commissioner, today accepted Dr. Connelley's proposition for a joint conference of Pennsylvania bituminous operators and miners on July 6 in an effort to settle the strike.

District officers of the United Mine Workers indicated they would announce their decision in a day or two.

FATE OF FORTY
MEN UNKNOWN

Conference to Be Held Saturday to Devise Methods for Settlement

WASHINGTON, June 28.—What may have happened to forty American employees of the Cortez Oil company, captured by rebels near Tampico and held with the company's property for ransom, remained a mystery tonight although the rebel raid occurred last Sunday morning. No further word has come since the consular dispatch Monday saying that lives of the forty Americans and \$250,000 in destructible property were held as security on 48 hours' notice for a payment of 15,000 pesos.

Department officials would not admit in any formal way that they felt any uneasiness because of the lack of information.

There is considerable perplexity here, however, over the fact that Consul Shawt at Tampico has not informed the state department as to steps taken by the Mexican federal authorities to obtain release of the captive Americans.

Information Lacking

The period granted by Goroza, the rebel chief, for payment of the ransom, had elapsed even before the department's advice were made known here. Directions to the embassy in Mexico City and to the consul insist on adequate protection for American rights and sentiment and upon punishment of the raiders went forward. So far as known late today no further word had come from any quarter to disclose what developed Tuesday morning when the time limit expired.

The Washington government today still withheld any step that might lead the way to demands that the Mexican government give the Americans in jeopardy protection. The attitude at the state department was the reports now available, did not justify despatch of warships to Mexican waters or any similar step.

Bielaski Escapes

MEXICO CITY, June 28.—A. Bruce Bielaski, the American kidnapped by Mexicans, escaped without the ransom his captors demanded having been paid, according to information reaching here from Cuernavaca, where Mr. Bielaski arrived this afternoon.

Salem Sewer Pipe Firm
to Dissolve Organization

The state corporation department yesterday issued a permit to operate in Oregon to the Warena Power company, Ltd., of British Columbia, but which has offices in Spokane. The corporation is capitalized at \$1,500,000 and does a hydro-electric business. Resolutions of dissolution were filed yesterday by the Southport Land company of Portland and by the Salem Sewer Pipe company of Salem.

for Wimbledon Matches

WIMBLEDON, June 28.—(By The Associated Press)—The feature of the play in the Wimbledon lawn tennis championship tournament today was the first appearance of Suzanne Lenglen, the French girl who holds the world's championship. Although she was tipped against Mrs. M. F. Ellis of England who was expected to be easy prey for her, nevertheless the match attracted thousands of spectators to the outside court to witness the play. As had been anticipated Mlle. Lenglen won as she pleased 6-0, 6-0. The French girl seemed to the experts to be playing at the top of her game.

The only other game in the women's singles was between Miss Elizabeth Ryan of California and Miss Head of England. Miss Ryan took the match, 6-3, 6-0. A number of contests in men's singles were played and in these there were several upsets. Notable among these was the elimination of B. J. C. Norton, the South African star by J. O. Anderson, one of the prime members of the Australian team. The score was 6-2, 6-3, 6-2.

CHERRIES HIT
SALEM MARKET

Lack of Moisture This Season Causes Farmers to Talk Irrigation

Some fine cherries were offered in the Salem market Wednesday, down to 5 cents a pound. They were snapped up early by discriminating buyers.

Most of the cherries of the valley have been contracted for 7 cents, or even a little higher, and the demand looks equal to two or three times the actual supply.

Staples Not Yet Started
The cherries are just beginning to come in to the canneries; a few soft white varieties, and a few soft white varieties, the Royal Annes, the Lamberts, the Bings, the Black Republicans, is as yet in full swing, though a few precocious Annes have been picked. The crop is not nearly as heavy as last year, in most orchards, though the quality seems good.

If the cherry men could have their way there would be a truce and a stay of execution with the rain-maker until the cherry harvest, though they'd have the loganberry growers and the milk makers and the general farmers to fight if a drought were put to a vote.

The first crate of logan came into the local market Wednesday. They were offered in the retail store at two boxes for 15 cents, a very low opening price. Much of the crop has been sold at 5 cents a pound and the retail prices will be little higher. A good soaking rain just now would be worth \$100,000 to the loganberry growers.

The dry season has brought to many a farmer the thought of auxiliary irrigation for a few acres of the most valuable, concentrated crops like berries.

A comparatively inexpensive gasoline outfit would easily pump water from wells, almost anywhere in the valley, to irrigate an acre or two, or even several acres, of good berry land and make several hundred percent on the investment. From the expressions heard among the farmers, another year may see the installation of a large number of little pump outfits for emergency irrigation.
