verting of the telephone system to private control, and this was followed shortly by an application of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company for further rate increases. The hearing began December 21, 1920. This resulted in the order of February 21, 1921, which made heavy increases throughout the state both for residence and business service and threw the public into a furore. The rates became effective February 28, 1921.

Rehearing Demanded—With the city of Portland leading and other cities and organizations following, a demand was made upon the commission for a rehearing. This opened in Salem July 18, 1921, and extended over a period of six weeks, sessions being held both in Salem and in Portland. The order issued February 21, 1922, granted no relief, and was the basis of the recall which caused the removal of Buchtel and Williams from the commission and the election of Kerrigan and McCoy.

thorized by Director of the Budget Dawes to determine its policy. Sullivan said General Sawyer had opposed the establishment of hospitals and interfered with the work of the veterans' bureau.

Industries to Absorb Men—The new employment unit in the bureau, Colonel Forbes explained, has made contract with the large industries of the country and is arranging to have disabled veterans given training and finally absorbed into these industries in regular positions.

He also said that he hoped to make it possible for a man who had been given rehabilitation training in a vocation for which he proved unfitted to be retrained in some other line.

Seniority rights and apprenticeship rules of labor unions have militated against veterans who are being given railroad training, according to spokesmen from Montana. Of other complaints made from the floor of the convention to Colonel Forbes, the most unusual was that from a veteran who said the hospital inmates at New Orleans were allowed only pajamas to wear, making it impossible for the veterans to leave the institution and visit their families. Forbes, announced that all complaints would be investigated and wrong conditions set right.

City Turned Over to Vets—The telegram in behalf of all but two of the students at the veterans' training school at Camp Sherman was followed today by the introduction of resolutions before the resolutions committee, signed by Michael Lyons, chairman of the executive committee of the disabled American veterans post at that place and two other committee members, I. L. Neal and James Lunn, demanding the closing of the establishment.

A sight-seeing trip around the day, recalling to many veterans

their brief glimpses of Nice, Cannes and the other points on the Riviera while on leave, took place in the afternoon. Theatre parties, banquets and dances also were arranged for the convention delegates.

RAIL WALKOUT IS NOW ALMOST SURE

The board, refused to comment on these two possibilities tonight. The action of the board in the threatened strike last October was interpreted as representing the board's position on the strike since the board has never had occasion to act in any strike of consequence, the chairman declined to state what the federal body's interpretation of the transportation act on that point would be.

NEW YORK PREPARED—NEW YORK, June 28.—Railroad officials and public officers went ahead today with plans to circumvent any tying up of traffic and necessary food supplies of greater New York in the event the railroad shop repairmen and maintenance of way workers go out on their threatened strike next Saturday.

The confidence was expressed at the offices of the 11 railroads entering New York that all traffic would be moved and no food shortage would result from the metropolitan because of the strike. The rail executives also said passenger schedules would not be interrupted. City authorities made plans to supply New York with milk and perishable food-stuffs by motor truck if necessary. Labor leaders estimated that more than 125,000 workers would be involved in greater New York in a strike of the car repairmen maintenance men and clerks.

Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon, who was here today with other members of the cabinet inspecting possible new sites for a postoffice, said that he did not think there would be a strike and that Washington did not feel alarmed over it.

MEXICAN BANDIT FINALLY KILLED

Monte Michaels Shot While Attempting to Rob Oil Company's Office

MEXICO CITY, June 28.—A bandit who for more than three years has led a roving band of marauders through the Tampico oil district, was killed the other day by one of his own countrymen who refused to believe that Monte Michaels, six shooter in hand, was on a friendly mission when he attempted forced entrance to the headquarters of a petroleum camp. Monte, a hard hitting and straight shooting American, came to Tampico several years ago, ostensibly to work in the oil fields. He tired of drilling and pumping and started out to gather some of the plentiful gold by means of the familiar stick-up system. He prospered and he gathered followers.

Two years ago a price was set on Monte's head by the International Petroleum company—\$10,000 gold for him, dead or alive. Monte answered the challenge by holding up a passenger train at Chorreras, Tamaulipas, and bag-

ging enough money to keep him and his followers for months. Other charges of banditry have been made against Monte but no one cared to match him in gun-play to gain the reward.

Several days ago, however, Monte entered an international petroleum company camp near Zacamixtle and finding the door of the headquarters office barred against him, he drew his gun and

demanded admission. An American, name not given, quietly opened a side window and filled Monte full of lead.
