ARMY WORKING IN CANNERIES

Rush Continuous at All Plants, Taking Care of Small Valley Fruits

More than 400 people are at work in the Oregon Packing company plant on South Twelfth street. They have worked continuously from the day the plant was opened more than two weeks ago, and the output has been most gratifying.

More than twice as many strawberries have been canned

Capacity Increased

The rearrangement of the plant, with the addition of some improved machines, and one extra line of canning units, gives the plant a greatly increased capacity. The plant is still running on strawberries, though most of them will be out this week. Already one line of machines is at work on cherries, and by the first of the week practically the whole factory will be devoted to this fruit.

Starr Has Good Run

The Starr company has 150 employees at work. They haven't even slowed down, once since the season opened. The factory, built and running in less than five weeks from the day the ground was broken for the building, has worked like a charm, without a hitch. The company is still running strawberries, and will con-

Cherry Prices Amuck

Cherry prices have gone amuck since the opening of the season. The market has strengthened under the eager buying of the California canners. Some cherries are known to be sold as high as 9 cents a pound. An uncorroborated report floated that some of the buyers have paid as much as 9 and one-half cents. This report is counted by conservative buyers to say that the market won't attack.

Prunes Being Bought

A few prunes are being bought for canning purposes.

Strawberries Nearly Gone

Only a few strawberries will come in for any of the canneries after this week. The drought has just about finished the crop, and the fact that a fairly good crop has been already harvested.

Other Camps Compared

"Albany has a free camp," said Mr. Albert last night, "but has nothing to charge for. We furnish all the dry wood the camper wants, hot showers all day and late into the night; laundry tubs, hot water for laundering, ironing boards, specially built sheet iron stoves with chimneys, besides considerable other furniture."

Portland Makes Charge

The Portland camp charges 50 cents a night while the Salem camp charges 50 cents for the first night and 25 cents for every night thereafter. The Portland camp furnishes gas for cooking and has a platform for washing cars. On the other hand, Mr. Albert says that he has heard from campers who have been there that the showers are only open two hours each morning.

The warm weather yesterday

kept more persons than usual in the local camp last night, 24 cars remaining over.
