BOYS RETURN FROM OUTING

Y. M. C. A. Lads Sunburned and Frazzled, But Happy Beyond Words

If they hadn't been traveling under the banner of the red "Y," which is ever the badge of respectability, the 35 lads, old, middle-aged and young, who came home from the Otis seaside camp, Friday afternoon, might have been run in by a dozen cross-roads constables as suspicious characters. They certainly looked the part, from the three-state secretary down to the cook, and from the tallest to the teeniest tad in tow. They came home with 35 noses blistered to a crisp, 70 heels blistered or almost, 35 shirts either badly sunburned or worn to various degrees of frazzleness, and dust enough to start 35 good farms if they had had a good anchorage place to unload. But happy! There never were 35 tickler kids anywhere since boys began to laugh and have good times together.

Ate Everything—They fished in the ocean, in the bay, in the river, in the wells; they ran and swam and crawled and climbed races; they fought herculean fights for cleanliness honors, even scrubbing themselves behind the ears and under the fingernails in an homeric battle for the spotless honors. They ate almost everything, and they sang and they danced and they looked like Trojans off to the great war.

Tri-state Secretary Yount, in general charge of the camp, with Bob Boardman as head of the athletics, and Verno Ferguson, Ben Rickell and Wallace Griffith of Willamette as group leaders. Ed Socolofsky headed the music and other entertainments, and the whole camp was organized to make both play and work a perfectly splendid machine. R. R. WHITE PRAISES GUARD TROOPS

Exceptionally Good Showing Is Made by Company F, Says General

"It was the best military encampment in the history of the Oregon national guard," is the verdict of Adjutant-General George A. White, who returned Thursday night with the rest of the soldiers from the infantry encampment at Camp Lewis and the artillery camp at Fort Worden. They had 1642 swaddies and doughboys and sore-foots at the camp Lewis meeting, where the infantrymen met. Colonel White says there was not a single instance of disorder or police, no arrests, no disturbance of any kind.

Morale Praised—"It is a character-building and good-citizenship campaign," he said further. "One of the things given was a half-holiday for everybody to attend a lecture and movie show, three hours long, depicting clean living, and the film coming from the United States government. It was fine in every way, and a wonderful object lesson that simply couldn't help doing good."

Religious services were held on both the Sundays of their stay, by the official chaplain, W. S. Gilbert.

Band concerts, two athletic field meets, baseball and a full line of clean, competitive sports, filled in the intervals between the actual military drill. The military features are said to have been exceptionally well carried out, through the spirit of rivalry stirred up among the various units of the guard.

No Accidents Recorded—Nobody was hurt in any way. It was an accident-less campaign. They did have one case of measles, that was promptly isolated, and apparently affected no one but its original victim. The boys got a great reception in Portland on their way home.

Colonel White spoke especially of the showing made by Company F of Salem, in its increased membership and its general military interest. He rates this as one of the most promising military units of the whole guard.

The Boys Wrote Letters—Company F did one thing that isn't always associated with the carrying of guns and the stabbing of bayonets—its officers demanded that every soldier write letters home to tell the folks at least hello and goodbye, and the captain collected and checked them off to see that there were no literary shirkers. The home folks in Salem probably wondered what had happened to their
