Big Bambino Does Stunt for Second Time in Major League Career

NEW YORK, July 1.—Ruth's knocking out three home runs in today's double-header with the Philadelphia Athletics is the second time he has performed this achievement in his major league career and the tenth time he has made three home runs in two successive games but on different days. He did it seven times in 1920 and twice last year when he established his home run record of 59.

Kenneth Williams of St. Louis Ruth's chief rival this year for slugging honors, registered three home runs in a single game early this season.

The late Adrain C. (Pop) Anson holds the record for home runs in two successive games. He made five in 1884 when with the Chicago Nationals.

Indian Brave Dances to Appease Angry Spirits

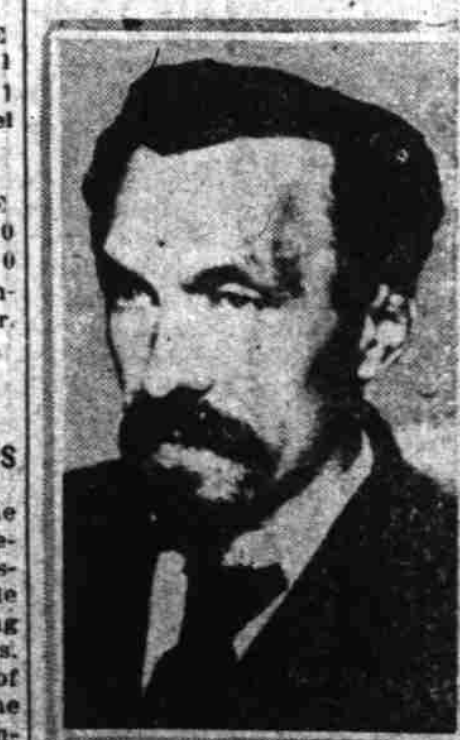
SANTA ROSA, Cal., June 21.—To appease the wrath of offended Indian spirits, Manuel Cordova, a young brave of the Geyserville reservation, near here, recently spent all one night dancing the war dance of his tribe, according to reports received here.

There is a tradition among the Geyserville Indians that holds that the spirits of the redmen will be offended if the braves dance their war dances before strangers. Cordova violated this law early this month when he led a dance of Gullford Indian school children at Cotati near here before about 20,000 spectators. Only by dancing all night and providing a feast for his fellows could the Indian return to the favor of the gods.

Although few of the spectators heard of it, Cordova, immediately after the dance, hurried back to Geyserville, tribesmen reported, and immediately started his all-night dance. Warriors and squaws of the tribe sat around throughout the night watching Cordova and at dawn sat down to a feast at which he was host.

Manuel's brother participated with him in his all-night penance and the Indian children of the Gullford school danced for several hours.

IRISH ISSUE IMRIE THEME

Chautauqua Speaker Has Faith in Anglo-Saxons—Opie Read Tonight

"I believe that the Almighty has placed on the shoulders of the two great branches of the Anglo-Saxon people, the destinies and the salvation of the world. Especially do we of the west, whether under the Union Jack of the Commonwealth or the Stars and Stripes of the United States, owe a debt to the old roughneck barons who wrested from the scowling King John at Runnymede, the Magna Charta on which civil liberty is founded.

"Through generations, there have been the successive waves of revolt against tyranny. They kept William and Mary out of the throne until they should agree to toleration. George Washington made another stupid tyrant bow to the people's will for freedom. And then when that latest German tyrant rose to wage through slaughter to rule the world, thank God we had learned the lessons of freedom and we were able to rise, ourselves and hurl this royal road hog of Europe from his murderous place.

"I believe that the American

Republic and the Commonwealth of Great Britain, alone, could emancipate the children of men from the awful scourge of war."

Irish Canadian Officer

These were two of the sentiments expressed at the Chautauqua program, last night, by Capt. Norman Allen Imrie, for four years an officer in the Canadian army in France. They were cheered to the echo.

Captain Imrie gave a very lucid explanation of things in Ireland; This followed after his striking parallel of the colonial courses of the two great branches of Anglo-Saxons, dividing with the outbreak of the American revolution. Great Britain grew, he said, to take in Australia, New Zealand, India, Egypt, Canada, Africa and islands in every sea; America has grown from the handful of hamlets on the Atlantic coast to include the Louisiana purchase, the acquisition of Texas, California, Alaska and finally the gods have thrust into the American up the four howling, squirming colonial infants of Cuba, the Philippines, Porto Rico and Panama. So many of the same problems now face both great Anglo-Saxon branches, that their genius and their opportunities are almost identical.

Irish Parties Defined

"There are three warlike parties in Ireland, said the speaker, 'The Nationalists, willing to stay in the Commonwealth but demanding home rule; the Unionists the Scotch-Irish of Ulster, who feel safer to stay with Great Britain with no change whatsoever than to trust to their rabid Irish countrymen from southern Ireland; and the Sinn Feiners, who will have nothing but their own language, their own all-ances, their own absolute independence from all treaty obligations or business affiliation.

Ulster Question Discussed

"Some of you will say, as other good people have said, 'why don't they sacrifice the Ulster minority and settle the question that has been ravaging civilization for so many years?' The government has one uncompromising reason; a reason stated as clearly by Lloyd George as President Lincoln stated the question of unionism in America. It is that of safety. If Ireland could be dumped into a steam shovel and hauled off 500 or 1000 miles, she might go, as any other capable part of the commonwealth would be al-

thousand ships that strew the floor of the sea off the Irish coast, where they were sunk by the German submarines during the war, tell what a menace to the other 40,000,000 people of the United Kingdom the presence of a possibly hostile partnership in Ireland could be. When most of the food that the Kingdom lives on comes in ships, those thousand grinning skeletons of hunger and starvation stand as unchanging arguments against a Sinn Fein separation."

Present Status Explained

The speaker told of the present situation, where after the Sinn Fein had sent two trusted delegates, Michael Collins and Arthur Griffith, for a final conference with Lloyd George, they had agreed to the plan of local self-government with the English civil and military influence all withdrawn, but retaining their affiliation with the commonwealth for defense and offense.

"The Sinn Fein president attacked them furiously, as traitors, but was defeated by an Irish parliamentary majority of seven. He refused to abide by the vote, and went to war. The other side, also, feeling that so slender a majority was too precarious, asked for a new vote. The prospect now is that De Valera is again beaten, decisively enough that the proposal will be ratified, and peace is in prospect.

Barriers Are Formidable

"North Ireland, with one-fourth the area and one-fourth the population, has three-fourths of the wealth, through its manufactures and industry. The barriers of race for north Ireland in mostly pure Irish, and the north has Scotch and English blood — a formidable; those of trade, and envy and business rivalry; and religion, are even stronger. The Ulster rebellion against an Ireland where it would be at the mercy of its Sinn Fein friends, was so formidable just before the German war began in 1914, that a prominent British general said there were not enough soldiers in all the British empire to quell them. The Ulsterites gave up all their private war and fought magnificently against the Hun; the empire couldn't now forget and sacrifice them to their Sinn Fein enemies. But maybe peace loomed to go. But the bones of a is in sight at last."

Musical Wonders Heard
The music for the afternoon

and evening, by the Patton Brothers of Portland, was as clever a novelty as the Chautauqua has ever presented. They are Oregon lads. They are more than mere musicians; they are inventors and geniuses and almost freaks.

They are husky and resourceful young men; they could take that piano in one hand, play it to its fullest capacity with the other, and turn handclappings with the other. The way that the athletic brother presented Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever" will make that piano see stars and stripes forever—and the audience cheered and cheered before it was half through and time to cheer. That was the great march of the Spanish-American war; even today, it would make men march into hell for the old flag—it would make an American fish-worm a match for an armored empirical rhinoceros, to hear that warlike and jubilant piece as the Pattons played it. It was a rather curious contrast with the pianist of the night before, with her grace and faultless rhythm.

The Pattons gave a series of seven episodes in the afternoon. "The Long Ago," "Russia," "The Orient," and four others, each in costume or stage coloring, with groups of songs and dances to picture each one.
