Dundee Earns Decision Over Sharkey, 15 Rounds

NEW YORK, July 6.—Johnny Dundee earned the judge's decision over Jack Sharkey in a 15-round bout tonight. Dundee weighed 129 pounds and Sharkey 127.

Sharkey loafed along with occasional rallies until the fourth. Dundee did the leading after a cautious first round, but at times found it difficult to reach Sharkey, who often walked away with his back turned. During several rounds, Sharkey did little except cover up, and with both hands Dundee shattered him continually.

After landing often in the second and third, Dundee shot a left to the head in the opening that sent Sharkey to his knees for a short count.

Sharkey came out of his shell for a brief rally in the fifth and took another lead in the seventh. Then Dundee drew blood from a cut over Sharkey's left eye.

Sharkey's unwillingness to mix in caused a chorus of boos from the crowd at the finish.

the law itself.

Court Controls Ballot Boxes
The ballot boxes in the suspected precincts will be under the control of the court. They may be opened and studied in the court room, and there only, if the court so desires. No other authority exists to open the ballot boxes.

It is the opinion of competent legal authority, that it would not be at all necessary to get the court's verdict on all of the specifications. For the contestant to win on any one of the seven counts, would be sufficient to gain access to the ballot boxes. Different precincts are charged with the seven different kinds of trespass; it is possible to sustain only one of the complaints, in which case it is still a moot question whether this would allow an examination of all the sus-

pected precinct ballot boxes. On one of the charges, that of allowing non-residents to vote, there were only 53 precincts accused, whereas almost 400 precincts were accused of some of the other election sins. If only the smaller charge should be sustained, it might not open the boxes for any possible investigation of the other charges.

Appeal in Doubt

Judge Bingham would not be quoted as to the right of appeal to the supreme court, without a careful study of the specific law defining corrupt practices, and the procedure to correct their evils. Some statutes are so grounded on the common law that the right of appeal is inherent. This matter, however, is more of a special statute, wherein the crime itself is the product of legal definition, and only the statute that defined the offense and the procedure, would be likely to give it the right of appeal. So the decision of the court of first instance, might be final, even if the litigants were not both satisfied.

Move to Dismiss Likely

The contestee will have the privilege of filing a motion for dismissal of the case, which will have to be heard, if filed. A demurrer to the facts, to the jurisdiction, to any other legal ground, might be filed, and this too would have to be heard. A final answer might then be filed which would put the case up to trial. The prosecution however, might follow the same course after each paper. It would be possible to drag the legal duel to great length. What the attorneys will do, is not yet made public.

The law seems to say that three days before the case is heard, the contestants shall file a list of the persons known to have been fraudulently or illegally accepted as electors.

This might be done in one class of fraud—like or allowing Democratic ballots to be counted where written in allowing non-registered aliens to vote; manifestly, it could not be done in

some of the other charges, such as over-counting the actual vote, or the Multnomah county refusal to allow Hall checkers at the ballot count. The whole law is in for a testing, and the seven grounds named in this contest ought to hit it as almost every spot.

Case is Pioneer

It will be possible, since this is a pioneer case, for the court to exercise considerable discretion in interpreting the law, which because it is so new, may be found leaky at every point—or it may be a juggernaut to destroy popular sovereignty if incorrectly or maliciously interpreted and administered.
