Some excellent fishing is reported from up on the Santiam, above Mehama. Roy Burton, of the Ladd & Bush bank, was one of the lucky boys during the past week. He had a toy spinner and line, and he was fishing away for dear life hoping to entangle some of the small fry, when a big steelhead took the bait and lit off down the track with it. It took the ardent fisherman a good part of half an hour, and wading into water up to his neck, to land the prize—but he did it. There was no more fishing for the Burton family that day; the banker took the trail for Salem as fast as gas would burn, to get the 24-inch beauty on the scales and into the burglar-proof vault for safe keeping. Others also have found some good fish up the same stream.

Exceptional catches have been reported from the vicinity of the Myers ranch, on the North San-

tiam. The fish are large and fat and sociable, and said to be simple-minded enough to bite on most anything. Salmon have appeared in the Alsea river, up from the coast; and salmon trout are showing in exceptional numbers, forecasting a remarkably good fishing season. The salmon trout have been almost as strange as the dodo or the hairy mammoth, in the Alsea waters for the past few years: their return is hailed with joy. It is within easy fishing distance from Salem, and many of the Salem fisher who will be hitting the trail for the coast waters where the salmon trout grow tall and thick.

JUDGE STANDS PAT IN BEAVERS CASE

Landis Refuses to Back Down in Case Affecting Portland Team Owner

CHICAGO, July 15.—The right of the commissioner of baseball to declare ineligible a club owner in the minor league was upheld today when Commissioner K. M. Landis denied the application of William H. Klepper and James R. Brewster, owner of the Portland club of the Pacific coast for a re-hearing of certain matters in his order of May 24 in which they were declared ineligible.

In the May 24 order Commissioner Landis had placed Klepper on the ineligible list until January 1, 1924, in addition to placing William Kenworthy, former manager of the Portland club, on the ineligible list until August 19, 1922 and disqualifying him as a player or manager in the Pacific coast league until the beginning of the 1924 season. The case arose originally when Klepper sold his interest in the Seattle club of the league and a few days later gave an unconditional release to Kenworthy, one of the Seattle players. Kenworthy was then hired by Klepper and associates to manage the Portland team. Seattle protested and Judge Landis declared Kenworthy, Klepper and Brewster ineligible.

BASEBALL AND TENNIS ADOPTED BY JAPANESE

TOKIO, June 22.—(By mail).—Baseball and lawn-tennis have been adopted as national sports by new Japan. The former has long been popular at the university and American colleges sending teams over have now to choose of their best to stand any chance of winning against the stars of Waseda, Keio and other universities, as was proved by the failure of Indiana university to win more than one watch on its recent tour. Other schools are taking up the game, while every vacant lot and wide street has its quota of coming stars of the diamond.

Lawn-tennis is becoming equally popular and whereas a few years ago the cups and prizes went to foreign players living in Japan, now they are won by Japanese. In this year's tournament of the Tokio club most of the foreigners, and there are many good players among them, were eliminated in the early stages.

The interest taken in the game by women, they forming by far the largest body of spectators at the courts, has included the Japanese Lawn-tennis association to offer prizes for Japanese women, at its second national tournament to be held in the fall of 1923. When the California man put himself out of running at the seventh-first, a newspaper man rushed to the locker room and told Sarazene he had won. He jumped from the bench, turned a handspring and let out a yell. A few moments later he was carried out on the shoulders of some of the golfers who had gathered around and given cheer after cheer.

Reaching down in his pocket, Sarazene pulled out a roll and took off \$150 in American money. "This is for the kid who helped me win," he said and handed it to his caddy.

The tournament produced record-breaking golf. All of the prize-winners—the first 12—finished with scores of 300 or less. This is two strokes less than the 302 score with which Hagen won the British open championship.

The tournament also brought a new era in professional golf, for it found all of the old guard—Hagen, Barnes, Hutchison, Evans, Mitchell, Duncan and the many others whose names are by-words in the golf world—were swept out of the running. A boy triumphed over age and experience, while another boy was tied for second and only one veteran—Black—really pressed the winner. And Black is comparatively unknown except on the Pacific coast.

HOOKED DRIVE KEY TO GOLF VICTORY

Gene Sarazene, 21 Years Old, Pushes to Front in Champ Contests

SKOKIE COUNTRY CLUB, Glen-coe, Ill., July 15.—Gene Sarazene of Pittsburgh, a little 21-year-old native born American of Italian descent, today pushed his way out in front of the world's greatest golfers, many of them old enough to be his father, and won the national open golf championship with a score of 288 for 72 holes of play, lasting two days.

A hooked drive out of bounds in the 71st hole, followed a moment later by a wild spoon shot, cost John Black, Oakland, Cal., professional, a tie for first and these strokes, with a missed putt a few greens earlier, kept him from winning the title.

He finished a strike behind Sarazene in a tie with Bobby Jones youthful Atlanta, Ga., amateur, for second, while William Mel-born of Shreveport, La., was fourth with 290 and Walter Hagen of Detroit, British open champion, fifth with 291. Jim Barnes of Peckham Manor, New York, defending his title was less successful out of the running, finishing well down the list.

Only one of the three Britons finished among the first 12, George Duncan trying for sixth with Leo Diegel of New Orleans. Jones was the only amateur in this list.

Sarazene's victory came in typical American fashion for he was hardly considered even a possibility at the start of today's play and had to fight his way through from a place in the rear. He did it with an exhibition of golf that has seldom ever been approached in a titular contest for his final 18-hole 69-two strokes under par and one of the only two scores to break par in the two days of play. This 68 equalled the course record in competition and tied Hagen's low mark of yesterday. When Sarazene turned in this

"Unfortunately, pain is not a sign of cancer," he said, "and painful lumps are less likely to be cancer than the painless lumps."
