PRINCE LOREE WINS PAPER MILLS PURSE

KALAMAZOO, Mich., July 19. (By the Associated Press.)—Prince Loree, winner of the \$5000 paper mills purse, was obliged to equal the state trotting record of 2:03 3-4 made by Mabel Trask in the same event on the local track in 1916 to defeat the Great Volo, the favorite in the first heat. The double gaited champion then annexed the other two miles and won with the Cox colt a close second in each heat. The three miles were made in the average time of 2:05.

Sun Flash had a hard time defeating Esta G. in the 2:17 pace. The Cox entry finished first in the initial heat, but was obliged to follow the Canadian mare under the wire in the second. Cox came back and won the third heat in

easy fashion with Esta G. finishing away back. Parker Boy, the favorite in the 2:09 pace, had a hard time finishing ahead of Peter Hanley. The latter entry was first under the wire in the second heat, but Berry in whipping finishes, managed to land the other two.

The 2:14 trot provided the upset of the afternoon. Bill Sharon, the Nova Scotia flash, making his first start in two years on the grand circuit, was the favorite. The \$25,000 performer finished fifth in the second and third heat after which he was sent to the barn by Tommy Murphy.

Topsy Todd, the Canadian mare, finished behind Holyrood Hilda in the first heat and then came back and took the next two.

Governor Mayby sketched the turbulent and hazardous days of the country following the revolutionary war up to the time of the adoption of the constitution. "When the people subscribed to that instrument," he said, "then was assured the growth of this nation to its present proportions. The people and the constitution make the republic. Both go together. Neither can exist without the other. The people and the constitution are the government of the United States."
