Ohio Gelding Victorious in Three Straight Heats—Attendance Large

KALAMAZOO, Mich., July 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—The last day of the Kalamazoo grand circuit heading was given over to the pacers with three events put over in fast time. The free-for-all pace with six starters developed a real race between Jimmie McKerron, Hal Mahone and Sir Roch. The Ohio gelding took the first heat after a hard drive with Hal Mahone close up and the Dean entry in the last heat. The Ray entry repeated in

the second heat but was chased to the wire by Roy Grattan with Sir Roch third and Hal Mahone at the end of the string.

Sir Roch stepped out and took the final mile, forcing Ray into second position with Hal Mahone third. The race was paced in an average time of less than 2:02. Johnnie Quirk and Lokan H. Edgewood were drawn at the close of the second heat. Roy Grattan ruled favorite at the start.

Hal Bee, the favorite in 2:11 pace, found the field anything but soft and was forced to give way to Henry Direct, except in a third heat, when the Nebraska mare finished in front. The Sherwood came home second in the opening heat but after that was unable to stand the speed. Hal Bee made several bids to win on the stretch but Henry Direct was able to uncork the necessary speed to hold the lead except in the final mile.

The 2:14 pace belonged to Minerva Gentry the favorite, all the way. The Marvin Childs entry was the class winning three straight while Fagan and Minnie Williams were raced out in an effort to head off the Gentry mare.

The attendance for the five days meeting was a record breaker.

Deputy Game Wardens Cited on Contempt Count

ASTORIA, Or., July 21.—Deputy Game Wardens Larson and Morgan who have been patrolling the sea off the Columbia to enforce the purse sealing act with in the three mile limit, were cited by Judge Cushman of the federal court at Tacoma, to answer charges of contempt. It was said here that Carl D. Shoemaker, master fish warden for Oregon, and Ernest Seaborg, supervisor of fisheries for Washington, also were being served with citations although neither was here today.

The case arises from difficulties in the interpretation of Oregon and Washington laws regulating purse sealing for salmon.

Vancouver Oarsmen Win Regatta Honors

PORTLAND, Or., July 21.—Vancouver, B. C., won the honors in the first day of the two-day rowing regatta of the North Pacific association of Amateur Oarsmen here by winning the Junior four oared race and the junior doubles.

Portland took one race, the single sculls and the James Bay Aquatic association of Victoria did not win a race.

The main event of the day, the junior four-oared race, was a sweeping victory for the stalwart oarsmen from Vancouver.

Their No. 1 crew composed of W. G. Welford, how; N. Hess No. 2; B. Roe, No. 3, and C. H. B. Finlayson, stroke, won easily with the Vancouver No. 2 crew second. The Portland crew swamped at the mile and did not even finish.

The James Bay club of Victoria did not have an entry in this event.

All the races were rowed over a course that was badly roughened by a fresh breeze from the north into which the oarsmen had to pull. This made fast time impossible.

BILLIARD RECORD MADE  
PARIS, July 21.—Roger Conti the French billiard player, in a match with Gibelin, another Frenchman, ran 3,600 points at 18.2 balkline in 59 innings for an average of 61. French billiardists claim this is a world's record average, the former record of 57 having been held by Jake Schaefer, the world's champion. Conti's high run in the match was 432, as against Schaefer's record of 436, made in 1921. Gibelin in the match scored 2136 points.

## FIRES SWEEPING TIMBERED AREA

McKenzie River Country Is Threatened by Furious Forest Fires

EUGENE, Ore., July 21.—The forest fire in the Cascade mountains adjoining Blue river, caused by the burning of the Antlers hotel and other buildings there yesterday, is spreading to the green timber, according to word received from there today.

Some of the finest timber in the McKenzie country is in the path of the flames. The forest service has a crew of 20 or 25 men at work trying to check the spread of the flames.

EUGENE, Ore., July 21.—The army airplane patrol operating out of Eugene located seven new forest fires in the coast section of Oregon today.

One of the planes was disabled this afternoon when it was compelled to land on the local golf links before it could reach the municipal aviation field, on account of lack of gasoline.

Flames Threaten Park  
BEND, Or., July 21.—Fire fighters from the Shevlin logging camps were today opposing a blaze of considerable proportions which at one time threatened Shevlin park, in the Tumalo canyon, and also the Tumalo fish hatchery. It was believed that the flames would be controlled tonight.

Jimmy Keane Wins Title in Roque League

CHICAGO, July 21.—Jimmy Keane of Washington Park, today won the diamond medal title of the American roque league and with it the roque championship after a week of competition with the country's masters.

Though he had led all other contenders throughout the week of play, which ended today, Keane nearly lost his laurels this afternoon when he was defeated by A. G. Buffan, of Los Angeles 22 to 15. Through this victory Buffan finished the tournament with a total of 458 points, only six below Keane's total of 464.

A. B. Wilson, of Washington Park, finished third with 408 while F. C. Turner of Pasadena, Cal., had 390 for fourth.

BRENNAN IS MATCHED  
NEW YORK, July 21.—Leo P. Plinn, manager of Bill Brennan, Chicago heavyweight, announced upon his departure from the city tonight that he intended to meet Jack Keane, Jack Dempsey's manager in Detroit tomorrow for the purpose of signing articles for a Brennan-Dempsey encounter at Michigan City, Ind., on labor day.

Limerick in Hands of Irish Free States

DUBLIN, July 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—Limerick is completely in possession of the free state forces, it is officially announced, but no details of the final engagement with irregular troops are given.

With Limerick and Waterford in the hands of the national forces, the attack on this line now has been opened in earnest and a combined assault is expected shortly.

The free states have occupied Tulamore, where they were received with enthusiasm and popular rejoicing. They now dominate Kings county.

SUN'S TROOPS IN RETREAT  
CANTON, China, July 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Sun Yat-sen's forces in northern Kwang Tung, on whom the deposed president of South China has been pinning his hope of regaining power, have been defeated and are in retreat, pursued by the troops of Chen Chiung-ming, who overthrew Sun, according to advices received here today from Shu-chow.
