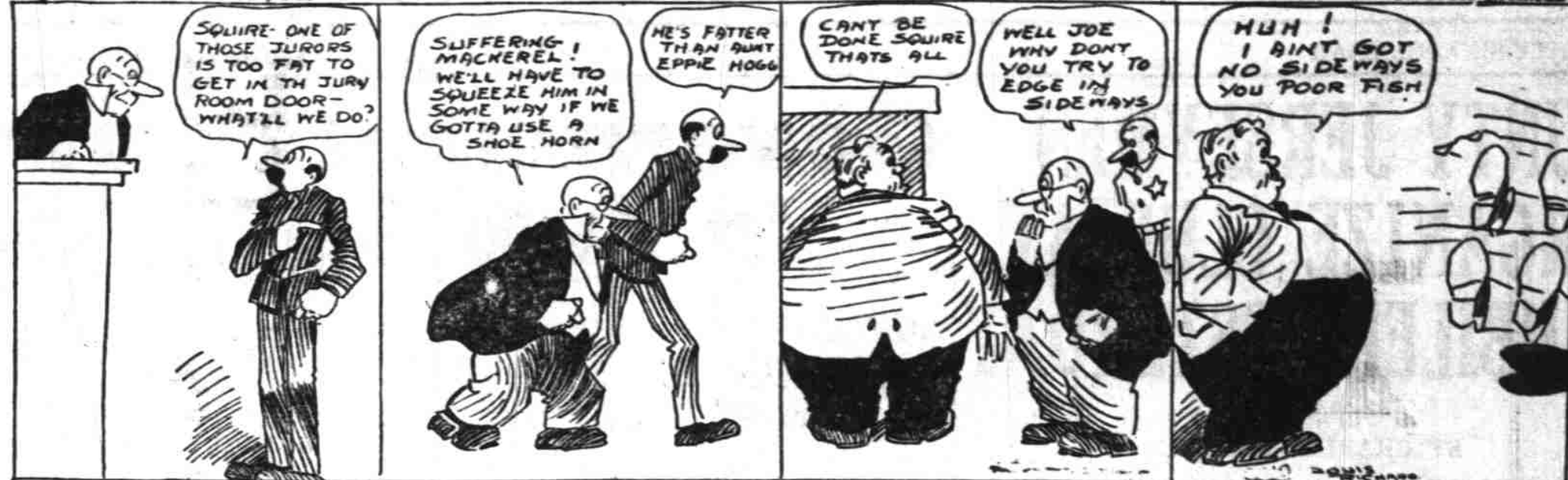

## ENGAGED AS ROWING COACH AT YALE



EDWIN LEADER

Edwin Leader, a graduate of the University of Washington and only twenty-nine years of age, is the new rowing coach at Yale—the youngest man holding a position of that character in the country. The surprising news that the Elis had engaged the man who brought out the startling Washington crew, which finished second to Navy at Poughkeepsie, came from Seattle and was confirmed by Professor Clarence Mendell for the Yale Athletic Board of Control.

## Emergency Exists, Averred

The first step toward control of depleted transportation facilities and coal supply came shortly afterwards in a statement from the interstate commerce commission, declaring that an emergency existed in the territory east of the Mississippi which required the commission to direct the routine of all essential commodities and to fix preference and priority status to control movement of food and fuel. The priority order was followed by a "general service order" from the commission, notifying "all common carriers" that an emergency existed which required them to disregard usual routing practice, freight rate divisions and traffic regulations so as to obtain the most expeditious movement of essential freights.

Becoming effective tomorrow the commission's mandates give railroads first priority on fuel requirements with electric power, light, gas, water and sewer works, ice plants, serving the public and refrigeration plants engaged in preservation of food, following in the order named.

Commission Approved  
Proposed appointment of a federal commission to investigate the coal industry received further support today in a resolution introduced in the senate by Chairman Borah of the labor committee. Mr. Borah suggested the commission be composed of three members, appointed by the president and that it recommend the advisability of necessity of nationalizing the industry, or of the initiation of government regulations.

In outlining the government position in the railroad strike, administration spokesmen said it had been decided that the railroad labor board's statutory authority to determine wage and working conditions for railroad employees must be recognized and upheld and that the attempts to operate mines in spite of the miners' union strike must be continued until it is demonstrated that not enough men are willing to work under state and federal

## protection to bring out an adequate tonnage.

President Keeps Informed  
It was added that the administration was struggling to deal fairly with the entangled rights of all parties to the widespread industrial controversies but intended above all to hold the majesty and dignity of the government of the United States.

While the railroad labor board would be upheld in its endeavors to deal with the strike of shop craftsmen, it was intimated in official circles that if the concession of seniority rights to strikers who have left the service would result in their return to work, the railroad managements ought to yield the point.

President Harding, it was said, would remain in intimate contact with any steps which the labor board might take.

## Grave Concern Felt

There was no concealing that grave concern had been given government officials by verified reports concerning the dwindling of coal output. Almost no new production has been attained in the Pennsylvania unionized coal fields since troop protection has been furnished, and non-union production in West Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky has decreased far below levels maintained in June.

President Harding was said to feel that the bituminous industry had too many miners and too many mines, and to have advanced a proposal that wage contracts should hereafter guarantee workers 250 working days a year, with a penalty clause against employers who failed to operate mines accordingly. The plan met with "scant favor," it was said, when put before operators and miners some weeks ago.

It was also pointed out that the miners license requirements under Illinois, Indiana and Pennsylvania state laws, the latter applying particularly to the anthracite region, made it impossible to build up any new labor forces.

Martial Law Declared  
AUSTIN, Texas, July 25.—Governor Neff late today declared martial law in Denison and ordered the five companies of national guard now at Camp Mabey to proceed there to enforce his proclamation.

Martial law becomes effective at 5 o'clock tomorrow morning. The governor also issued two other proclamations placing the strike situation at Childress and Sherman under provisions of the open port law. Rangers from Denison will go to these places to take charge. Detachments of rangers from

## Denison will also go to Cleburne, Temple, Amarillo, Marshall, Lufkin, Kingsville, DeLeon and Waco to do guard duty and protect railway shopmen.

However, there last named places are not being placed under the provisions of the open port law. Any other railroad towns or points needing protection will be afforded it in the same way, the governor said.

## Way Is Opened

This formal announcement of the carriers' inability to serve the public in the transportation of necessities opened the way for the distribution of coal under the plan unanimously adopted by representatives of the producing fields in conference with Secretary Hoover.

The directing agency for the emergency machine—a presidential committee chosen from the interstate commerce commission, the departments of commerce, justice and interior, with Secretary Hoover as chairman—will be named by President Harding tomorrow, according to administration officials.

## Committee to Direct

This committee, with the aid of an administrative committee of operators, railroad traffic experts and probably representatives of public utilities will direct the activities of local committees of operators in maintaining fair prices and in distributing fuel to the carriers and other public utilities in the order of preference established by the interstate commerce commission as best suited to serve the needs of the general public.

Two orders, both based on its declaration that an emergency in transportation existed, were issued by the commission.

## Railways Get Orders

Railroads were directed to supply coal cars to mines "for such special purposes as may from time to time be designated by the commission or its agent therefor," the agent mentioned being the presidential committee which will direct coal distribution. Special needs having been cared for, carriers were directed to use all equipment for transporting of fuel, first to the railroads and other common carriers; second, to public utilities; street railways, power, light, gas, water and sewer work, ice plants and hospitals;

third, to governmental, local, state and federal bodies.

## Fuel Coal Next Preference

Domestic fuel coal generally was given the next place in the preference list.

Railroads were forbidden to divert or to reassign shipments, except as they might be needed for a superior use under the order or classification set forth. They were further required to discontinue use of cars suitable for coal shipment in any other traffic, and railroads not serving mines were required to begin daily deliveries of suitable coal cars to coal carriers. The order giving priority for food and other shipments was qualified by a clause stating that such preference should be shown by a carrier only "to the extent that it is currently to be unable promptly to transport all freight traffic offered it for movement."

## Contracts Disregarded

In the routing orders, applying all over the United States, the commission required the roads to disregard existing contracts and agreements applying to freight revenue divisions.

Both orders were made effective "from and after July 26," and were based on authority delegated to the commission by the transportation act. It was expected the "special purposes" classification set up in the commission order would be the foundation of the entire price controlling effort of the government's coal distribution plan, by serving to prevent cars getting to mines whose owners did not take fair prices.

## Ministers Protest at Leonard-Tendler Fight

JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 25.

A protest against the holding of the Benny Leonard-Lew Tendler lightweight boxing championship contest at Boyle's Thirty Acres Thursday night was made to Mayor Hague today by the Rev. Harvey L. Wyatt, acting for the Society of New Jersey for the Prevention of Crime, a newly organized ministerial association.

Dr. Wyatt told the mayor that the Tendler-Leonard affair would be demoralizing. He asked the mayor to see to it if the fight actually did take place that the law for the punishment of crime was enforced.

"The mayor thanked me and said 'nothing more,'" Dr. Wyatt said later.

## School Taxation Plan Is Denounced at Meet

SEATTLE, Wash., July 25.—The 30-10 plan of school taxation was denounced by the state federation of taxpayers' associations, meeting here today. The association announced that it would do everything possible to defeat the initiative bill embodying the plan.

A resolution unanimously adopted declared the plan "outrageous" and "pure bunk."

"Farmers are now paying more taxes than their production warrants, and under the 30-10 plan which will increase their burdens, production is bound to decrease in the poorer districts," said J. J. Hammer, secretary of taxpayers' economy league, Spokane.
