TENDLER GIVES LEONARD HARD FIGHT IN NO-DECISION BATTLE

RINGSIDE, Jersey City, N. J., July 27.—Benny Leonard, world champion lightweight, and Lew Tendler, his challenger, fought 12 rounds without a decision here tonight. Leonard had the better of the final rounds.

Newspapermen about the ring differed to some extent in their opinions. The majority appeared to favor Leonard at the end of the bout, although some declared for a draw. Tendler had the better of the first five rounds, but Leonard finished strongly.

Leonard was asked why he did not knock out Tendler and replied with a blood-smeared grin: "Southpaws are hard to solve."

What the Boys Said

In the way to his dressing room Leonard made this statement to his brother, Joe, who gave it to the Associated Press:

"I was stunned in the first round when Tendler butted me in the eye with his head. The blow had me stunned for four rounds. I am anxious for a 15-round decision bout with Tendler."

When Tendler was shown this statement, he smiled and stated that his manager, Phillip Glassman, would speak for him.

Glassman said: "Everyone who saw the fight is satisfied that Tendler pummeled Leonard's eye with a punch. Why didn't he squawk when he claimed Tendler butted him in the eye, as that is the only round in which he didn't squawk."

"Tendler will gladly box Leonard for a decision, for I am sure he can do much better, as he did not do as he expected—knock him out."

It was 9:13 when Lew Tendler, the challenger, escorted by a squad of police, made his way down the aisle from his dressing quarters and entered the ring. He was clad in a greenish-gray turtleneck and was accompanied by his seconds, Phillip Glassman, Morris Tendler, his brother, and Jack Reinfell.

Champion Leonard entered the ring a moment later and both contenders for the title were given a great vocal ovation. Leonard's seconds were Billy Gibson, Manny Seaman and Charlie Leonard, his brother. Both Leonard and Tendler were called to the center of the ring, where the commission physician examined their hearts and lungs and announced them to be in perfect condition.

Both boxers had their hands heavily bandaged with soft tape. The rival managers examined the bandages and the new gloves

were taken from boxes and given to the rival seconds. The weights as announced from the ringside were: Leonard 134 pounds, 15 ounces; Tendler 134 pounds, 12 ounces, the weights being taken at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Charley White of Chicago, challenged the winner and Rocky Kansas of Buffalo, recently defeated by Leonard also appeared with his left arm in splints.

Fighters Are Nervous

Both fighters appeared more or less drawn and nervous, and Leonard appeared a trifle more drawn than Tendler. Leonard leaned over the ropes and jokingly remarked to a friend at the ringside that the bout would be over in a few minutes. Tendler sat quietly in his corner with downcast eyes and listened attentively to the instructions of his seconds.

Tendler Rushes Champion

Round 1—The bell rang at 9:28. Tendler was short with two rights and then landed a light left. They fell into a clinch and began dancing around. Tendler landed a left hook to the chest and followed with a light left to the body. Tendler landed another left and then two sharp rights to the body.

Tendler was rushing the champion. Tendler slipped and fell and standing up, slowly wiped off the dust from his gloves. Tendler landed a hard right to the champion's head, cutting his right eye.

Tendler was warned for hitting in a clinch. They were sparring at the bell and when he sat down Leonard said the cut was caused by a butt. Leonard held a towel to his eye to stop the bleeding.

Round 2—Tendler missed two rights and rushed the champion into a corner. Leonard sent a hard right to the jaw. Leonard missed a right and left. Tendler had the best of a clinch. Tendler landed a hard left and followed with short uppercuts. Tendler landed a short left. Leonard countered with a right to the body and followed with two short uppercuts. Tendler continued landing and had the champion covering his face with both arms. Tendler landed hard rights and lefts to the head and then three more lefts to the jaw. Blood was trickling from Leonard's eye-brow.

Tendler in Lead

Round 3—Tendler again jumped into the lead. Tendler was again warned for hitting in a clinch. Leonard complained of Tendler's low hitting. Tendler replied with a left swing to the jaw. Tendler smiled. Tendler had the best of a body exchange and landed two rights to the jaw. There was another exchange at close quarters. Tendler missed with his left. Tendler told the champion "come in and fight." Tendler rushed Leonard to his corner at the bell.

Round 4—Tendler tapped lightly to the ribs. They exchanged at close range. Tendler landed a left to the body. Leonard countered with hard right crosses to the jaw. The champion landed short uppercuts. Tendler followed with a cluster of hard uppercuts to the body. Leonard spat blood. Leonard missed with right and slipped to his knees. Tendler walked away. Tendler kept punishing away with his left. Leonard landed hard rights to the body. Tendler sunk his left in the champion's stomach. Benny took two right hooks to the jaw. Tendler was pounding his right to Leonard's jaw at the bell.

Leonard Rest in Clinch

Round 5—At this point newspapermen admitted that Tendler was far in the lead. Leonard was short with a right and then he lunged heavily into Tendler's body crossing his left to the jaw and hooking his right. Leonard out-fought Tendler in a clinch.

Leonard put two hard rights in Tendler's stomach. He added another. Tendler landed rights and lefts to the mid section. Tendler kept reaching his left all over the champion. He missed a long left uppercut. He had the best of another clinch. Leonard's best showing was in this round.

Round 6—Tendler's right went to the stomach. Leonard rocked Tendler with a left. He added a right and left to the jaw. Tendler missed with a left. Tendler began to run away and clinch.

Leonard landed two hard rights to the jaw. Tendler was again warned for hitting low. Leonard began jabbing away with his left and crossing with his right. Tendler landed three hard lefts to the head. The crowd was in an uproar. Leonard shot a volley of rights and lefts to the body and sent two sharp uppercuts to the jaw. Tendler's lips were bleeding and gore was on his chest when the bell rang.

Champ Loses Tooth

Round 7—Leonard predicted before the fight that he would win in this round. Tendler hooked two lefts to the head. Leonard had the better of an exchange. Tendler jabbed rights to the body and hooked lefts to the head. Leonard sent two long rights to the jaw. Leonard accused Tendler of hitting low. Leonard spat out a tooth. Tendler sent lefts to the heart. They fought at close range and clinched. Leonard sent an uppercut to the jaw and crossed a left to the body. Leonard hooked a right to the jaw. He repeated. Leonard was coming back strongly.

Round 8—Tendler jabbed with his right and crossed with his left. He landed two lefts to the jaw in a clinch. Both swung at long range. Leonard sent two hard rights to the body. Tendler hooked three hard rights to the head. The champion was reeling with rights and lefts to the jaw. The champion hung on and talked to Tendler angrily. Tendler ran the champion around the ring shouting to the referee that Leonard was holding. Leonard shot a left to the jaw. Tendler smiled at the champion and took a hard left uppercut to the jaw. Tendler pounded his left to the body and when the bell rang Tendler asked "how's that?"

"That was nice work," replied Leonard.

Fighters Talkative

Round 9—Tendler hooked his left to the jaw and body. Leonard landed a hard right to the jaw. They kept up animated conversation. Leonard landed a hard left to the body and hooked a right to the jaw. He landed another left. Leonard missed a long uppercut and then sent a hard left to the jaw.

Tendler rocked the champion with a left to the chin. Leonard danced away grinning. Leonard sent a hard right to the body. Leonard uppercutted sharply to the jaw with a right. Tendler had the advantage of inflicting at the bell.

Round 10—They clinched. Tendler missed a right. Leonard hooked two rights to the body. He sent another and followed with a right to the jaw. He sent two short uppercuts to the jaw. Leonard jabbed lightly and then sent both fists to the face.

Leonard kept leading and landing with his right. Leonard sent two short uppercuts and rushed Tendler to the ropes. Tendler fought back and sent three left hooks to the jaw. Tendler backed away. Leonard jumped like a cat, smashing two rights to the jaw and sending the challenger to the ropes. Tendler fought back.

Jab at Long Range

Round 11—They jabbed away at long range. Leonard was short with two uppercuts. They clinched. Leonard began his dancing tactics. He landed two right hooks, a short right uppercut and a left to the jaw. They exchanged close together. Tendler sent a series of lefts to the head. Leonard landed a terrific short uppercut to the chin and brought blood from Tendler's mouth. They fought furiously at close range. Tendler missed with his right.

Leonard jabbed with lefts, feinted, and sent a left to the jaw rushing Tendler to a neutral corner. Leonard seemed to be growing stronger.

Round 12—Leonard sunk a right to the stomach. Tendler rushed in, landing lefts to the jaw. He swung a hard left to the jaw and right to the head. Leonard landed wide rights and lefts. Leonard had the better of a vicious exchange at close quarters. They danced around. Leonard landed short rights to the jaw, sent both hands to the body and rushed Tendler to the ropes. Leonard missed a right uppercut and hooked two glancing rights to the jaw. Leonard sent two hard rights to the jaw. Leonard uppercutted with rights and lefts. They were fighting hard at the bell.

GATE RECEIPTS AT BOUT BIG

Attendance at Leonard-Tendler go 6,000 and Cash Amounts to \$45000

RINGSIDE, JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 27.—The great pine bowl built on Boyle's 30 acres for the memorable encounter between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier in July 1921, presented another remarkable spectacle to-night as the crowds gathered for the lightweight championship between Benny Leonard, title holder, and Lew Tendler of Philadelphia. When the first preliminary fighters were called to the ring the arena, having a seating capacity of more than 90,000 appeared to be about three fourths filled.

At the ringside, Tex Rickard, the promoter said the gate receipts were about \$50,000 and the attendance about 60,000.

Leonard Gets Two-Thirds

Under the terms of the agreement with the principals in the contest they are to receive from 62 1-2 to 66 1-2 per cent of the gross receipts. Of this sum Leonard will receive practically two-thirds, the other third going to the challenger.

The seats at the top of the bowl cheapest in the arena, were about one-third filled. Many of the spectators in this section purchased miniature opera glasses on the outside of the arena, for 50 cents.

When the lights were turned on for the first preliminary the skies which had been overcast all day, began to clear and the colors of the sunset tinged the clouds. The vigilance of the police was relaxed for a minute on one side of the arena and several hundred boys and men came over the top. They found seats in the crowd and remained unmolested.

Preliminaries Begin
The first preliminary between Johnny Cooney and Jack Munroe New York lightweights, ended in the sixth round when Cooney tore his trunk and the boxing commission called a halt.

The principals in the second bout at 10 rounds were Phil Krug of Harrison, New Jersey and Joe Quinn of Minneapolis, middleweights. It was announced that the main bout would follow this encounter, the bout scheduled originally for the semi-final to be held after the Leonard-Tendler contest.

The Krug-Quinn bout was shortened to seven rounds when it was announced that Leonard and Tendler were ready to enter the ring. Krug has lead.

Krug finished with a rush of blows and had slightly the better of the milling.

The threatening weather, it was announced, led the promoters to advance the championship contest and avoid any possibility of postponement.

When Krug and Quinn finished, a squad of policemen entered the ring.

The usual preliminaries to a championship contest, introductions and so on, began.

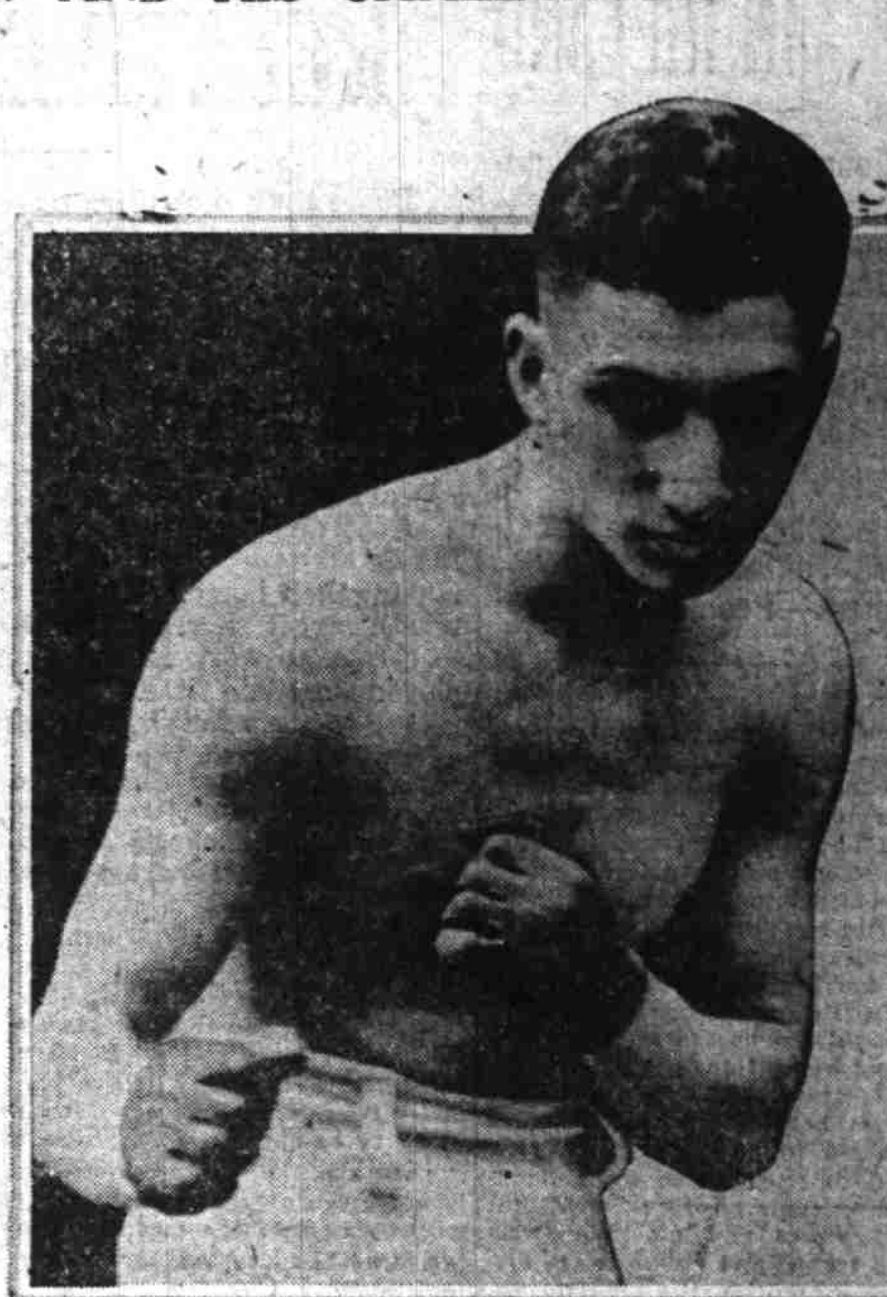
