BEAVER CLUB OWNERS LIKELY TO GET OUT OF ORGANIZED BALL

SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—The directors of the Pacific Coast Baseball league will meet here tomorrow to ratify the ruling of Commissioner Landis that William Klapper and James Brewster, Portland club owners, be suspended from participation in organized baseball as a result of the affair in which player William Kenworthy left the Seattle club to play with Portland this year.

William H. McCarthy, president of the league, has announced his intention of abiding by Judge Landis' ruling, but J. Cal Ewing, owner of the Oakland club, said last week he would defy it.

Klepper has continued to act as president of the Portland club and has as yet made no announcement that he will turn the club affairs over to anyone else.

According to the Landis decision, Kenworthy becomes the property of the Pacific Coast league tomorrow.

RACE PROGRAM MADE BETTER

Lists of Entries for State Fair Events More Elaborate Than Ever

BARTON COMES TO FIGHT PEST

Representative of Agricultural Department Outlines Campaign Here

S. A. Barton, of the department of agriculture, especially delegated to follow the trail that the pine blister rust has not yet made in Oregon, was in Salem Friday and gave some interesting information regarding the menace.

There is in Oregon about 23 billion feet of pine to be affected, and that much in Idaho. The pest has not yet gotten a foothold here, but the \$200,000,000 worth of timber that it could eat, up is worth saving. Fully 40 per cent of these values are on state or federally-owned timber lands. It is a public affair, so look after the protection.

Congress appropriated \$100,000 for an investigation fund. The United States officials aim to do the laboratory and field work of finding how to fight the pest, and then it is up to the states and the private owners to carry out the approved plans.

Mr. Barton visited the month state normal school Friday and talked to the 700 school teachers on the importance of interesting the schools and the children in this and other protective work. To make every child a scout for the reporting of such conditions as the pine blister rust prevalence, would aid enormously in stamping out all such plagues. With this particular pest attacking the young trees first, and so almost instantly setting the problem of reforestation by eliminating all the young tree growth in the pine forest sections the sure loss of the vast and perpetual revenue of carefully forested lands, is bound to affect the heritage of the children now growing up, or their children in the next generation. To interest the children in protective citizenship is recognized as the best hope of the conservationist.

Mr. Barton was a former resident of Salem. He was with the Portland Railway, Light & Power company for a number of years before he went into the forestry service in 1915. He helped organize the Cherlans and has hosts of friends in Salem.

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MINE BATTLE AT CLIFTONVILLE, WEST VIRGINIA



This is the first picture of the actual fighting ground at Cliftonville, West Virginia where seven were killed and thirty injured during a blood battle between armed mine guards and strikers. The guards sought to repulse an attack made on the tipple

of the Richland Company's mine by three hundred strikers. Here is shown the post office, general store and railway station at Cliftonville. In the background is the burning mine tipple and just beyond it the woods, where the major part of the battle raged.

SLEUTH TELLS OF BOMBINGS

Special Investigator Testifies to Purchasing Bullets for Chicago "Boss"

CHICAGO, July 31.—Testifying that he had purchased bullets for Timothy (Big Tim) Murphy, union labor leader on trial with Fred Mader, former president of the Chicago building trades council, and three others charged with conspiracy to commit murder, Harry Paygman, was called to the witness stand today.

Paygman, who said he was formerly a railway detective, testified that he had conversed with Murphy on numerous occasions, and had a confidential relationship with the labor leader, started the court room when he admitted that he had been a special investigator working out of the office of Chief of Police Fitzmorris.

Paygman said he had been assigned to shadow Murphy and to cover the building trades council offices after bombings and other acts of violence blamed by the police to union warfare against a wage mediation award. For ten days, he said, until the time of the arrests after the slaying of two policemen by a party of bombers, he saw Murphy, Mader and the others every day.

The state announced that it hoped by Paygman's testimony to prove that the man who drove the automobile from which the shots were fired which killed the policemen was operating under the direction of the other defendants.

MILLIONAIRE KILLED
SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—Herbert Hamilton Brown, millionaire insurance broker of San Francisco, suffered fatal injuries and John Black of Oakland, nationally known golfer was injured so seriously that attending physicians believe he will die as a result of an automobile accident near Irvington, in Alameda county tonight. Brown died in a San Jose hospital, where he was taken with Black.

Alice Robertson Is Confident of Nomination
