Washington County Reports—Washington county has a total enrollment in its schools of 6062 pupils, according to annual report filed with the state educational department by Mrs. Emma Bryant, county superintendent of schools. The per cent of attendance for the year was 96.2, considered unusually good. The schools had a total of 225 teachers, of whom 185 were women and 40 were men. The women received an annual monthly salary of \$112.46, and the men \$154.81. The total cost of education in Washington county for the year was \$382,547.33, of an average of \$63.10 for each pupil enrolled.

Will Build Gymnasium—A gymnasium at Gresham will be erected at a cost of \$20,000. It will be a tile building. Freeman & Struble, architects of Salem, were selected as architects by the school directors of Gresham at a meeting held Thursday night for the proposed gym to be built for the district. The proposed building will be approximately 60 by 100 feet in dimensions, of hollow tile construction with stucco exterior trim. An additional boiler will be installed in the present heating plant to heat the building. Mr. Freeman, who was in Portland yesterday, stated that plans would be completed in about two weeks when proposals would be called for.

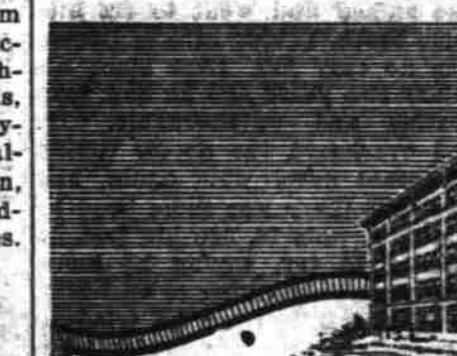

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BONDS MAY BE OF NO AVAIL

Devers Thinks Supreme Court Opinion Would Further Hinder Program

Carried to its ultimate conclusion the interpretation to the law as made by the state supreme court in an opinion Saturday would mean that counties could not use even their county bond money on state highways designated as market roads, according to J. M. Devers, attorney or the state highway commission.

The supreme court opinion held that money levied for by the counties under the Pearce bill of 1919 could not be used on state highways because the law makes it, applicable only to those roads under the exclusive jurisdiction of the county courts.

"Exactly that same language is used in the county highway bonding act," said Mr. Devers, "and should the court hold the same in regard to the bonding act as to the Pearce market road act it would put the state highway commission in a hard position, and according to the language of the two acts it is susceptible to the same interpretation."

About two-thirds of the counties have bonded themselves for highway construction.
