**Deportation Hearings Held**—Deportation hearings involving an inmate of the Oregon State Hospital for Insane, Leopold Kasper, and two inmates of the penitentiary, G. Ramon, and Tony Campa, were heard yesterday by R. P. Bonham, immigration inspector for Oregon. Gamon, Mexican, was sentenced before he had been in the United States five years and since he entered without inspection and can neither read nor write in any language, he can be deported on any of three charges. Kasper is a naturalized Canadian while Campa's case is complicated through the fact that he served with the American forces in Italy, returning to the United States in 1919. It is said he may be able to claim exemption on the plea that the last time he entered the United States, which was less than five years ago, he was with the American army.
