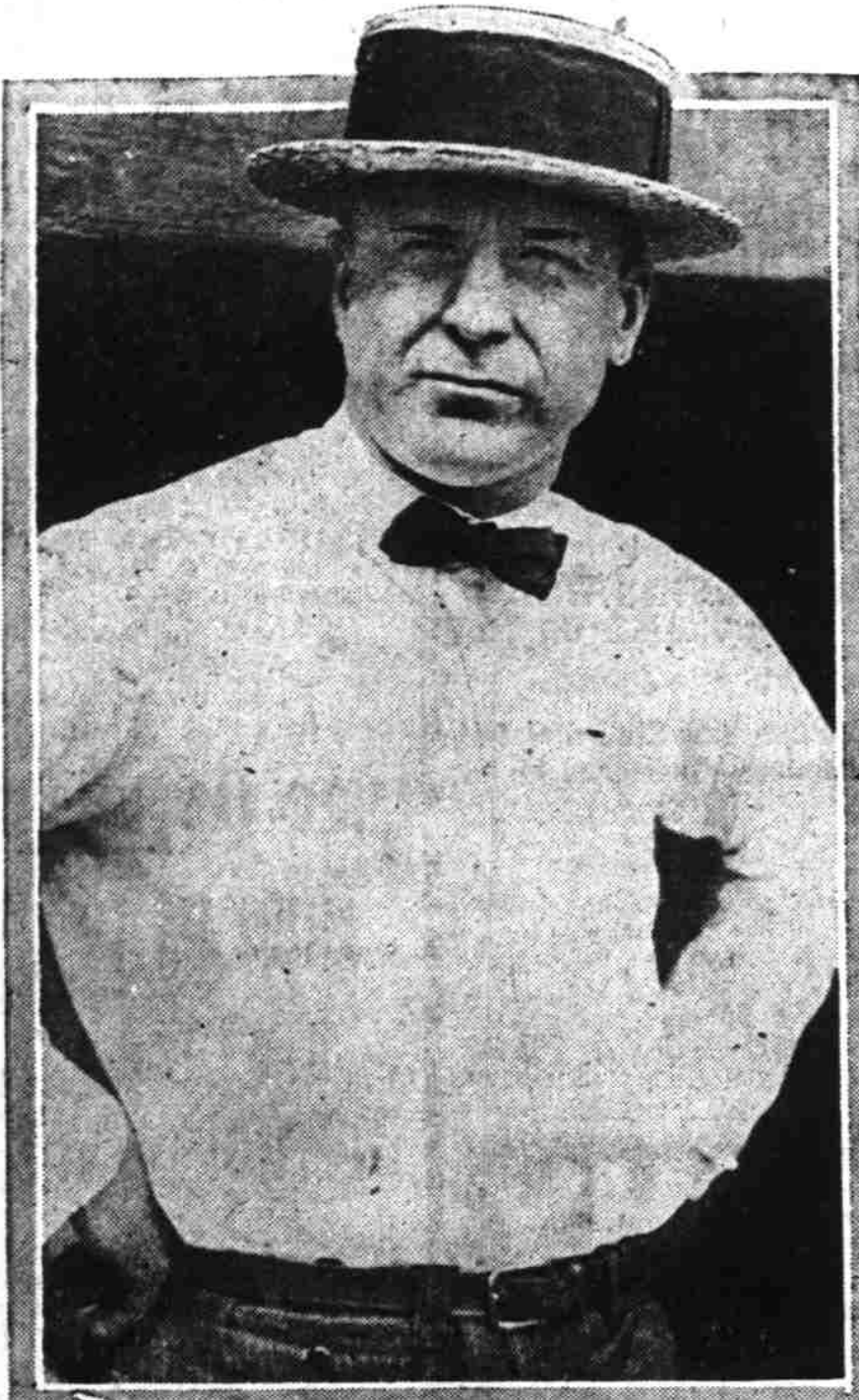
Washington 3, Chicago 2.

HARNESS HISTORY MADE BY NEDDA

Pretty Daughter of Atlantic
Express and Pleasant
Thought Wins

FORT MIAMI PARK, Toledo, Ohio, Aug. 4.—(By Associated Press).—Nedda, the handsome daughter of Atlantic Express and Pleasant Thought made Grand Circuit harness horse history here this afternoon by trotting a faultless mile in 1:59 1-4 without pacemakers.

Over what grand circuit drivers said was the fastest track yet seen here, the little daughter of Atlantic Express finished under the whip, by quarters: 29 1-2; 59 1-4; 1:29 1-2 and 1:59 1-4.

Harry Fleming, who arose from a sick bed to drive the exhibition mare decided to discard the running mate because of Nedda's extreme nervousness, and for the same reason the mare will be utilized for exhibition purposes only. Fleming said.

The world's trotting record for mares is 1:58 1-2, made by Lou Dillon accompanied by two running mates and the record established by Nedda without pacemakers is considered by harness horsemen a finer performance for this season.

KENWORTHY IS GIVEN RELEASE

Former Portland Manager
Will Join Club in East, He
Tells McCarthy

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 4.—W. J. Kenworthy, former manager of the Portland club of the Pacific Coast league, was given his unconditional release today by President William H. McCarthy. He expects to join a team in the east.

Following the decision of Judge Kenesaw M. Landis that President W. K. Klepper of the Portland club might retain his position, but must not deal directly with the players or in the affairs of the team, Kenworthy was adjudged a free agent by the league. He was instructed to report to President McCarthy. This he did today by wire from Portland. He asked that his release be telegraphed to him saying that he was negotiating with a club in an eastern league, and should be able to come to terms, desired to go directly east.

Judge Landis' decision of May 24 made it plain that Kenworthy must not play in the same league in which Klepper was interested.

LEONARD MEETS HAMMER TODAY

Champion Cannot Lose Title
Unless He is Stretched
for the Count

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., Aug. 4. (By the Associated Press).—Benjamin Leonard, world's lightweight champion, will defend his title for the third time within a month tomorrow afternoon when he meets Ever Hammer, a rugged lightweight of Chicago, in a 10-round no-decision contest in Promoter Floyd Fitzsimmons' new arena. As they will box at catch weights, Leonard will not lose his title unless he is stretched for the count.

Both Leonard and the blonde challenger finished their training today. With the exception of a damaged right eye, received in his match with Lew Tendler in Jersey City a week ago, Leonard is in good condition.

Hammer, finished his training to the satisfaction of his handlers, who said the Chicagoan has not been so strong or so fast since he staged his comeback a year and a half ago. Since then he has engaged in 14 contests, winning all of them. Hammer expects to enter the ring tomorrow weighing 135 to 136 pounds, while Leonard will probably scale about 137 pounds.

It will be their second meeting. They fought in Kansas City in 1916 before Leonard became champion, and Hammer gave the
