CHARLIE WHITE
WINS BY K. O.

Bobbie Barrett of Philadelphia Sent to Canvas by Right to Heart

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Charlie White, Chicago lightweight, tonight knocked out Bobbie Barrett of Philadelphia, in the third round of their 15-round match in New York velodrome.

A stiff right over the heart sent Barrett to the canvas. He sprawled on his back, vainly trying to rise, and after being counted out was lifted to his corner, where he sat in tears. Two minutes and 57 seconds of the round had passed when the referee finished counting over the Philadelphia.

Barrett Forces Fight

Barrett put up a good battle, forcing it as long as it lasted. White cautiously avoided the reputed dangerous right hand of his adversary and when his opportunity to end the contest came, he was quick to take it.

In the semi-final to the White Barrett bout, Paul Moore of Memphis and Jack Wolfe of Cleveland fought 12 lively rounds to a draw.

The crowd did not like Moore's jumping tactics and booed the decision.

McKenna Good Boxer
Charles McKenna of New York, former amateur heavyweight champion, made his professional debut by giving a boxing lesson to Tim Kelly of Brooklyn. McKenna covered Kelly's body with blows, closed one eye and cut a gash over the other one. He was given the decision at the end of their six round bout.

Jack Worman of England and Sammy Green of the Bronx fought a four round draw.

Peter the Brewer Captures Press Purse of \$5000 At Cleveland

NORTH RANDALL, Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Nat Ray of Cleveland, formerly of Toronto, Ontario, had a field day at the opening of the second grand circuit racing meet here today, winning two of the three events. One of his mounts, Peter the Brewer, owned by Ed Stout, Pontiac, Mich., captured the Press trot with a value of \$5,000, the feature of the card.

Peter the Brewer was a favorite in the betting and took the event in straight heats. Baron Worthy and Eleanor Guy furnished what contest there was in the first heat in a fight down the stretch for the place, Baron Worthy winning second place. In the second heat, Eleanor Guy reversed the decision, taking the place.

Ray also drove Robert Direct, the favorite, to victory in the first division of the 2:14 pace.

The other event, the second division of the 2:14 pace, went to Buddy Mac in straight heats.

Just as the horses were scoring for the first heat of the 2:04 pace a terrific storm drove thousands of spectators to cover and a heavy rain made further racing impossible. The left, undecided, will be raced off tomorrow if the track is in condition.

Two Homers One Inning, Williams Breaks Record

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 7.—Veteran baseball writers tonight said that Kenneth Williams, left fielder for the St. Louis Browns, who knocked out his 29th and 30th home runs in the sixth inning of today's game between Washington and St. Louis Americans, set a new modern major league record, as they could not recall any other instance in modern baseball where one player cracked out two circuit drives in the same inning.

By hammering out the two four-base hits, Williams forged ahead of Rogers Hornsby of the St. Louis Cardinals, who had 28 home runs for the major league home run championship of the season.

Once in Western.

Public Safety Considered.

“We also have urgently requested by telegraph and telephone that a conference of all executives of labor organizations be held in Washington Friday, August 11.”

“We have requested this conference because we recognize that railway employees not now on strike will in defense of the travelling public and themselves, necessarily decline to operate the defective locomotives, and cars now in service.”

“It is clear to any unbiased person that railroad equipment is growing more unsafe each day and relief must be had through an honorable settlement. Employees now on strike are firm in their position and will continue so as long as the Association of Railway Executives declines to accept reasonable terms of management.”

Program Held Faulty.

In their message to Mr. Stone, the three union officials emphasized their conclusion that “the government has authority to settle the strike on the just, fair and reasonable basis proposed by the president July 31.”

“However, it is now apparent that no constructive program is proposed,” the telegram continued, “and that unless the railway employees can offer additional counsel and advice, the lives and safety of employees and traveling public already endangered by the continued use of defective railroad equipment, will be imperiled to a greater extent.”

Labor Chiefs Depended Upon.

“Believing that the chief executive of each of the standard railroad labor organizations, as a result of their years of experience, broad public viewpoint and sincere desire for industrial peace, can, by conference with the officers of the shop crafts formulate a program having for its purpose protection of the public, preservation of the railroad industry and an honorable basis of settlement for the managers and the employees, we urgently recommend that you, as chairman of the railroad organizations, wire each chief executive, requesting him to attend conference in Washington Friday, August 11.”

Harding Letter Public.

The president's communication to both parties of the strike was made public this afternoon after a visit to the White House of three union leaders, who waited over after meeting him Saturday.

An administration spokesman explained the president's belief that paralysis of transportation, especially in coal regions, was threatening the industrial and agricultural fabric of the country. No formal conferences with railroad executives had preceded the formulation of the new basis for settlement of the strike, it was said, and it was entirely the government's plan, built up from the position which the president has maintained between the contesting parties.

I. C. C. Called Upon.

Moved by the continued representations concerning the state of railroad equipment, the senate today passed a resolution calling upon the interstate commerce commission to report the exact condition in which it finds locomotives and cars. The commission, through its safety bureau, maintains an inspection service to determine whether legal standards are met by operating lines.

Southern Railway Settlement.

Southern railway officials, who have sought a settlement separately from other roads with striking shop craftsmen in its employ, also met a union commission today for the road, agreement was asked on the terms of President Harding's offer of July 31 and the return of full seniority status to all strikers, but adjournment until tomorrow was asked by union spokesmen because of the national settlement discussion pending.

Board Would Act.

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—The United States railroad labor board expressed its willingness to act on the seniority question now at issue between the railroads and their striking shopmen in a resolution adopted at a meeting late tonight.

The resolution was adopted by a vote of five members of the board to one, A. O. Wharton, a

labor representative voting against it. The six members were all that were in the city when the meeting was called. Ben W. Hooper, chairman, president. Those who attended were G. W. W. Hanger of the public group, Samuel Higgins, Horace Baker and J. H. Elliott of the railroad group, and Mr. Wharton and Mr. Hooper.

Proposal Distrusted.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—President Harding's new proposal for settling the railroad strike apparently advances “no constructive program” leaders of the strike shop craftsmen announced tonight after a protracted conference. They announced that a meeting of executives of all railroad unions, including the four brotherhoods would be summoned to consider what action should follow rejection of the proposal.

B. M. Jewell, head of the shop crafts federation said the president's settlement proposals constituted “a most uncalled for attempt to help the railroads break the strike,” and that “nobody ought to get the idea the shop federation will accept.”

Cavalry Entrainals.

HARTSELLE, Ala., Aug. 7.—Troop C, 109th cavalry, Alabama National Guard, entrained late today for Albany following reports of trouble in connection with the railway strike. Reports received here from Albany say that two negroes were shot and slightly wounded in Albany today, but no details are available. The troops were ordered to Albany by Governor Kilby.

Telegraphers Vote.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Telegraphers numbering approximately 1,100 on the Big Four railroad are taking a strike vote following the breakdown in negotiations over the interpretation of working rules, it was announced tonight by the company in a statement to the Associated Press.

The company stated that “when no agreement could be reached with the employees they offered to refer the matter to the railroad labor board for adjustment, as provided in the transportation act of 1921, but the union refused to take this action and strike ballots are now being taken.”

Detachment Arrives.

JOLIET, Ill., Aug. 7.—A detachment of 250 men of the 132nd Infantry, under command of Lieutenant Colonel Morris, arrived here this afternoon for duty in the strike area where a pitched battle was fought this morning between striking shopmen, sheriff's deputies and railroad detectives in which two men were killed and Sheriff Newkirk of Will county seriously wounded.

Quiet Prevails.

ALBANY, Ala., Aug. 7.—Quiet prevailed at the Louisville and Nashville shops here tonight, following the arrival of Company C, 109th infantry from Hartsville and a detachment from Company M, machine gun company of Birmingham.

Local authorities declared the situation was well in hand and that no further trouble was expected.

Governor Sends Troops.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 7.—National guardsmen from three Alabama cities were despatched to Albany this afternoon by Governor Kilby, following reports that disorders have been occurring in the vicinity of the Louisville & Nashville shops at that place since Saturday, when a man placed under arrest is said to have been taken from officers by a crowd of men said to have been strike sympathizers.

Conference Called.

BAR HARBOR, Maine, Aug. 7.—T. Dewitt Cuyler, chairman of the association of railway executives, tonight called a meeting of the members of the association in New York for Friday morning to consider President Harding's latest proposal to end the railway shopmen's strike.

Mr. Cuyler received the president's telegram embodying the proposal at his summer home here. Further than to announce calling the meeting of railroad executives, he declined to make any comment on the situation.
