DEMAREE INELIGIBLE
TO SERVE PORTLAND
AS CLUB'S MANAGER

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 15.—Vice President Gus C. Moser of the Portland baseball club received word this afternoon from Secretary John H. Farrell of the National Association of Minor Baseball clubs that Al Demaree, present manager of the Beavers, has been placed on the ineligible list.

Demaree was sold by Seattle to Denver last winter and reported there, but later left the club, claiming a sore arm. He pitched independent ball later around Chicago for about three weeks. Denver sold Demaree to Portland and after he reported here was made manager, succeeding Thomas L. Turner.

Moser will wire Farrell tonight to ascertain whether Demaree is ineligible to manage the club as well as play with them. Demaree is also wiring Farrell from Seattle.
