MRS. ERCLE KAY IS MEDALIST IN GOLF; HUSBAND IS SECOND

GEARHART, Or., Aug. 16.—C. W. Halderman, of Astoria, carried off the honors at the Gearhart golf tournament today with the low medal qualifying score of 149 for 36 holes. His strongest contender for the low score was Erce Kay of Salem, who turned in a card of 155 for the day's play.

Two youths, Douglas Nicol of Portland and Richard Lang of Seattle, were tied for third place on the qualifying flight with scores of 163 each. Match play will open tomorrow.

Mrs. Erce Kay, Salem, was medalist among the women, returning a score of 99 for 18 holes. Miss Frances Jacobs was the runner-up for the low score with a score of only one over that of the winner, 100. Other women who qualified with low scores were Mrs. J. A. Dougherty with 101 and Mrs. J. D. Nicol with 102.

The scores were not low due to the high northwest wind which seemed to hinder many of the players in their long shots. The total entries are 63; 44 men and 19 women.

Shufflin' Phil Douglas Dismissed; no Statement

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Aug. 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—President John A. Heydler, of the National League and Manager John J. McGraw of the New York National league baseball club, declined tonight to go into details regarding the summary dismissal today of "Shufflin' Phil Douglas, one of the pitching mainstays of the New York Giants.

Heydler and McGraw declared that the names of players involved in the affair would not be disclosed.

"We have issued a statement charging that Douglas wrote a letter to members of a competing team, offering to 'lay down' if financial inducements were 'worth while,'" said McGraw. "We also announced that Douglas admitted his guilt. So far as I am concerned, the affair is a closed incident."

Kenesaw M. Landis, of Chicago, supreme arbiter of baseball, witnessed the game between New York and Pittsburgh here today. During the contest he declined to discuss the affair "until after the game," and later, when approached by newspapermen, he said, sharply:

"My only statement is that I'm going back to Chicago tonight."

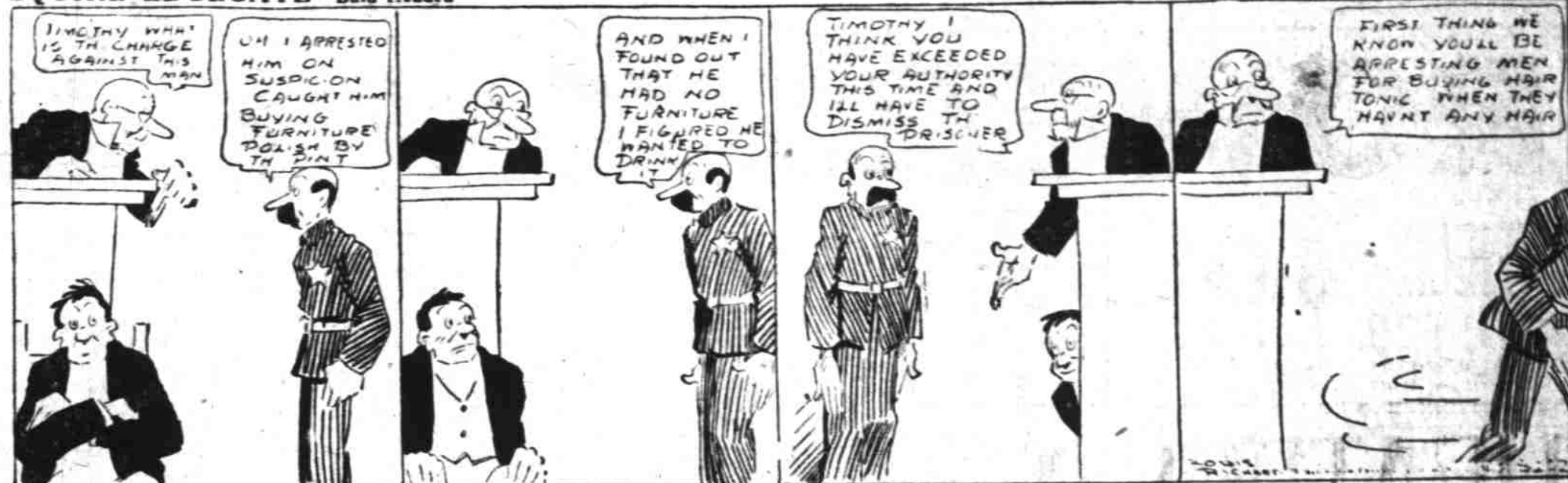
Manager Al Demaree Warns His Pitchers

Hutchison Outplayed by Eugene Sarazen Yesterday

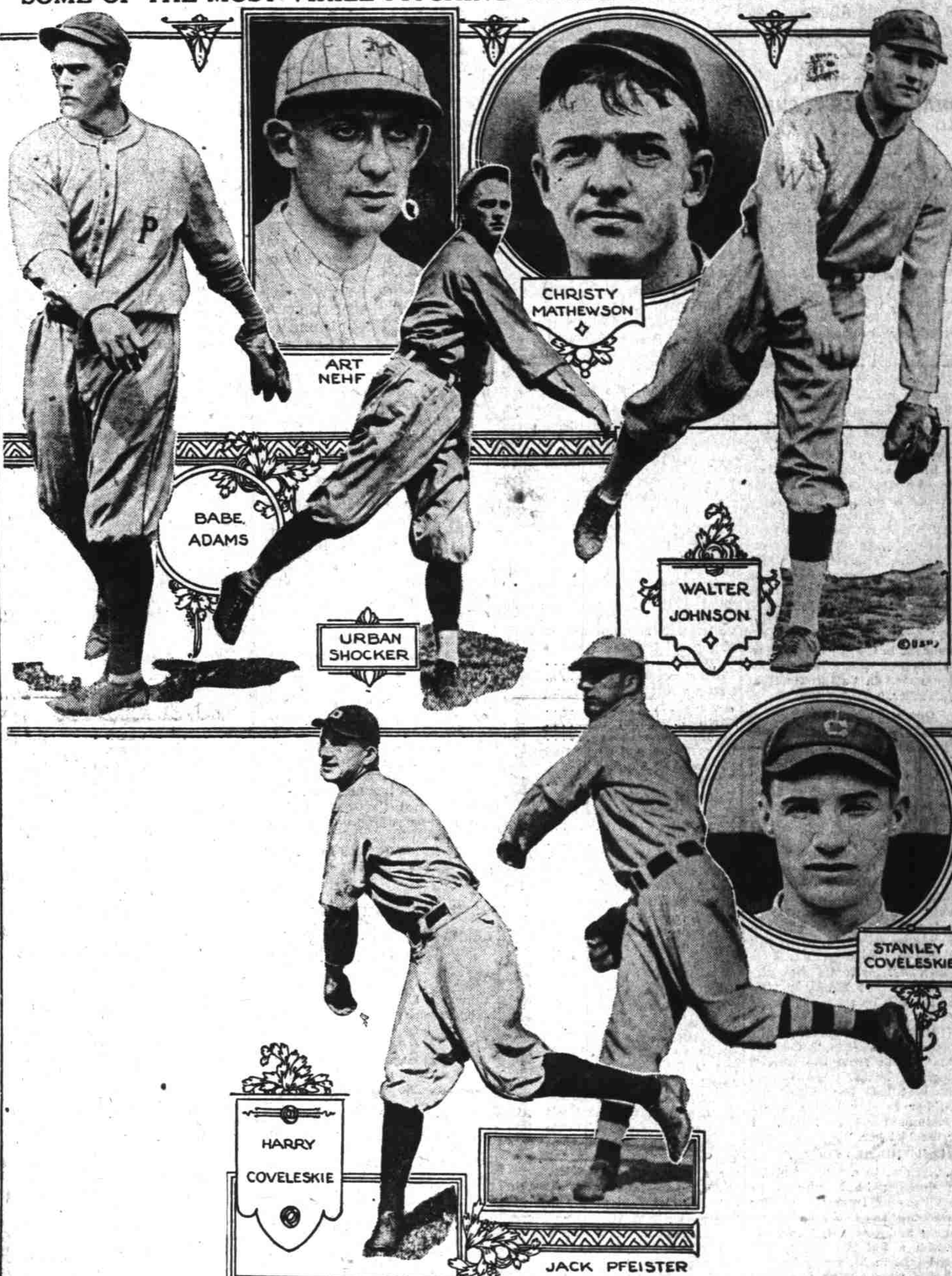
OAKMONT COUNTRY CLUB, Pittsburgh, Aug. 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—Eugene Sarazen, former caddy but now Pittsburgh's first golf citizen, removed a tremendous obstacle from his path tomorrow in the national professional championship this afternoon when he came from behind and won his 36-hole match with Jock Hutchison, Chicago's only survivor, 3 and 1.

The dark haired boy who won the national open title a month ago, trailed the mighty Scot most of the day but finally caught him on the home stretch of the afternoon round and then played Jock to a standstill. Tomorrow he must defeat Bob Cruikshank of Westfield, N. J., to compete in the final round on Friday.

Brilliant as Sarazen was today, his medal card was eclipsed by the play of Emmett French, the Youngstown, Ohio, veteran, who will be in the lower bracket of the semi-final with John Golden of Tuxedo, N. Y. Golden is regarded as a formidable adversary and golf experts forecast a historic semi-final.

FAST TIME IS MADE ON TRACK

Old Belmont Driving Park at Philadelphia Lives up to Reputation

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 16.—The Old Belmont driving park today lived up to its reputation as a wonderfully fast track for harness horses when the time for the 2:07 pacing event was hung up as 2:02 1-4; 2:01 1-4; 2:02. The race was a battle in every heat between Jackson Grattan, the bay stallion, sired by Solon Grattan, and the black mare, Edna Early, daughter of Robert C.

Cox drove Jackson Grattan and Thomas was behind Edna Early. The event was the Keim stake of \$2,500 and the handsome Keim trophy.

In the first heat the horses fought head and head all the way, with the stallion nosing out Edna Early at the wire. The second heat was just as exciting and once more the stallion won at the wire, Edna Early won the final heat, the killing pace, telling on both horses, although the time was faster

than the first heat. Three fast horses were distanced in this contest—Peter Henley, Cora Hal and John R.

The first race, the Nawbeck purse of \$2,000, went to Hope Frisco, driven by Tom Murphy, in straight heats. Best time 2:09 3-4.

Mary D. driven by McDonald, won the Keith stake for 2:14 trotters, worth \$1,000. Best time 2:08 1-4.

The Winogo special, a free-for-all for 2:05 trotters, was won by Jane the Great in straight heats. Best time 2:05.

New Barnstorming Rules Mailed to Club Owners

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—Notice of the amended rule regarding barnstorming by world's series players were being mailed to major league club owners today following the joint meeting of the two major leagues before Commissioner Landis here Monday.

The rule as set forth in article 4, section 8, relating to the world's series, was approved in its entirety but it was decided to amend that part touching upon the player and the club. As amended the rule sets forth that a player's application to the commissioner for participation in an exhibition game will not be granted unless it is accompanied

by the written consent of his club. The words added to the end of the section follow:

"Nor shall it be granted unless each player's application shall be accompanied by the written consent of his club."

Dempsey-Brennan Fight Is Stopped by Governor

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—Officials of La Porte county have until 2 p. m. Friday to order abandonment of the Jack Dempsey-Bill Brennan fight, scheduled for Labor day, it was indicated today at the office of Governor McCray. Unless the officials take action by that time the governor will order the bout stopped.

Governor McCray prepared a letter today to Sheriff William E.
