PHIL DOUGLAS WROTE TO MANN

Letter Offering to Throw Down Giants Sent to Cardinal Outfielder

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—"Shut-filin" Phil Douglas, pitcher, barred from organized baseball because of a letter he wrote offering to "throw down" the Giants, today declared the letter was sent to Leslie Mann, St. Louis Cardinal outfielder.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 18.—Branch Rickey, manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, tonight said he had "nothing whatever" to say in regard to Phil Douglas, who was barred from organized baseball because of a letter he wrote offering to desert the New York Giants.

Manager Rickey refused to talk about any angle of the case. Douglas said that following the last game he pitched on July 31, he went to the apartment of a friend "not drunk and went to sleep." He added that two detectives dragged him from the apartment and took him to a sanitarium where he was held until August 5.

Upon his release, he said, he believed McGraw, manager of the Giants, had suspended him and he wrote to Mann who was in Boston with the Cardinals, the letter offering "to go to a fishing camp" if this was desired because he was afraid that if he stayed with the Giants he "would win the pennant for him," meaning McGraw.

After writing the letter, the pitcher said he was called to the Polo grounds by McGraw. "When I left, I knew I had not been discharged," Douglas said. "Following the visit to McGraw's office, Douglas said he called Mann on the long distance telephone and requested him to tear up the letter. Although Mann agreed to do this, the pitcher added, he showed the letter to his manager, Branch Rickey, who in turn informed McGraw, commissioner Landis and John Heydler, president of the National League.

The former Giant star declared that he was drunk, that he had been given hypodermics and that he was not himself when he wrote to Mann. He realized this, he said, too late. The same day that he requested Mann to destroy the letter, Douglas said, Dr. William Bender, the Giants' club physician, called at his apartment and gave him hypodermics, to quiet his nerves and that he repeated these ministrations for two days.

In Pittsburgh Douglas was summoned, according to his story to McGraw's room. There he was questioned by Judge Landis, who finally told McGraw that he could not use Douglas any more.

While he was in the sanitarium, Douglas said, McGraw fined him \$100 and five days' pay and then he was given a bill for taxicab fare and treatment in the sanitarium. The latter amounted to \$224.

"I was broke," the big pitcher said. "I thought McGraw had fired me. I haven't got any way of making a living except in baseball and I was sore on McGraw. I had to do something for a living so I wrote to Mann."

"I'm not sore at Mann because he turned the letter over to Rickey. It was all my fault. 'I just didn't realize what I was doing.'"

Douglas, who was placed on the permanent ineligible list by the Giants after the player to whom he wrote and asked for "inducements" to leave, turned the letter over to his manager, revealed that he had no liking for Manager John

McGraw of the Giants and his assurance that McGraw could not win without him. Commissioner Landis made no comment on the letter and refused to divulge the name of the player to whom Douglas wrote. The letter follows:

"New York, Aug. 7, 1922.

"To Dear—
"I want to leave here but I want some inducement. I don't want this guy to win the pennant, and I feel if I stay here I will win it for him. You know I can pitch and win. So you see the fellows and if you want to, send a man over here with the goods and I will leave for home on the next train. Send him to my house so nobody will know and send him at night. I am living at 145 Wadsworth avenue, apartment 1-R. Nobody will ever know. I will go down to fishing camp and stay there. I am asking you this way so there can't be any trouble to anyone. Call me up if you are sending a man, Wadsworth 3210 and if I am not there, just tell Mrs. Douglas. Do this right away. Let me know. Regards to all.

"Phil Douglas."

Judge Landis said he believed Mrs. Douglas was not involved in Douglas' plan, although she is mentioned in the letter.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 19.—Leslie Mann, outfielder for the St. Louis Cardinals, early this morning flatly denied that he had received the letter from Phil Douglas, New York Giant pitcher, offering to "throw down" the Giants, which resulted in the New York management barring Douglas from organized baseball.

Mann said he was surprised that the former New York player had made the statement that the correspondence and telephone conversation following it were with himself. The Cardinal outfielder also expressed surprise that Douglas had been guilty of the act for which he was suspended.

Australian Tennis Team May Play United States

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 18.—Australia's Davis cup tennis team tonight stands within one match of the challenge round and the right to play the United States trophy defenders. On the courts of the Germantown cricket club this afternoon Gerald L. Patterson and Patrick O'Hara Wood defeated Manuel Alonzo and Count Manuel De Gomar, the Spanish representatives in the doubles match in straight sets by scores of 6-3, 6-3, 6-4.

While the play was closer than the score would appear to indicate, the Australians always dominated the contest and seldom failed to come through with the winning stroke when a point was actually necessary.

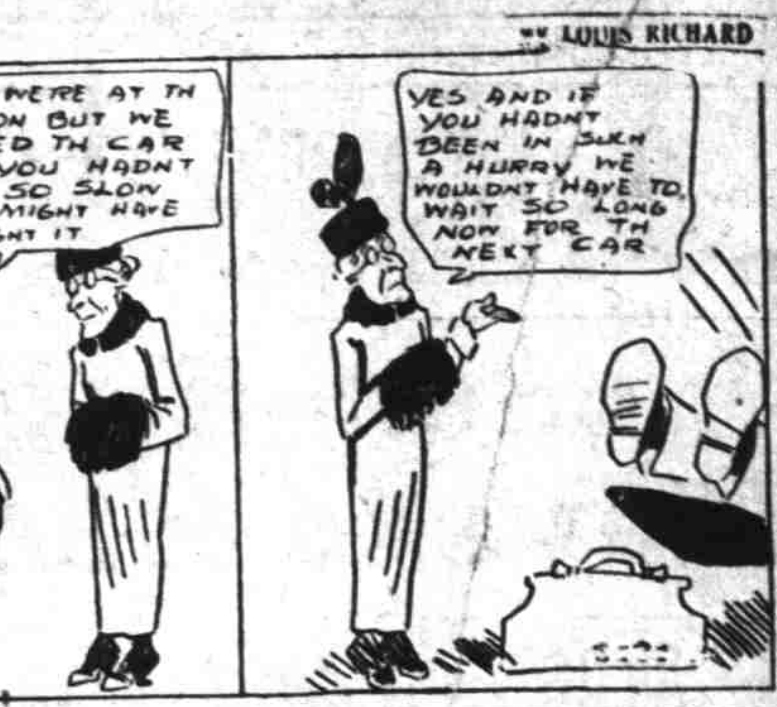
POLAND INCREASES ARMY

Anyway, she appealed to the police matron when her meager wealth had been exhausted to help her find a place in some Salem home.

The girl is strong and frank in appearance and willing to do most any kind of housework, provided she may be given a home where she can work out her life problems. She is being cared for by the police until a home can be found for her.
