RIFLE TEAM IS SELECTED

Members of 14-Man Delegation Announced by Adjutant General White

Will Leave Monday

Formal orders were issued yesterday by General White directing the team to proceed from Portland to Camp Perry. According to arrangements made, the team will leave at 9 a. m. next Monday from the Union depot, over the Union Pacific line and will arrive at Camp Perry, Ohio, next Friday. Practice for the national matches commences next Saturday and the Oregon team will immediately go into intensive training in rifle and pistol marksmanship for two weeks preceding the matches. They will compete with crack teams from the regular army and navy and also national guard teams from other states. The team will return to Oregon the last of September.

Grade Pay Received

While on this trip the enlisted members will receive transportation, subsistence and the pay of their grades. Officers of the team will receive transportation and the pay of their grades. General White received a communication early in the week from the war department stating that \$6,737.13 of the federal funds had been set aside for the purpose of paying the salaries of the Oregon riflemen and to defray other expenses of the trip.

At a late hour yesterday Captain Paul Hendricks, commanding the local company, informed Adjutant General White, that Sergeant Allison Mason of Salem, who was selected for a place on the team, would be unable to get away and it was necessary therefore to substitute another in his place.

Funeral of Silvertown Woman Will Be Today

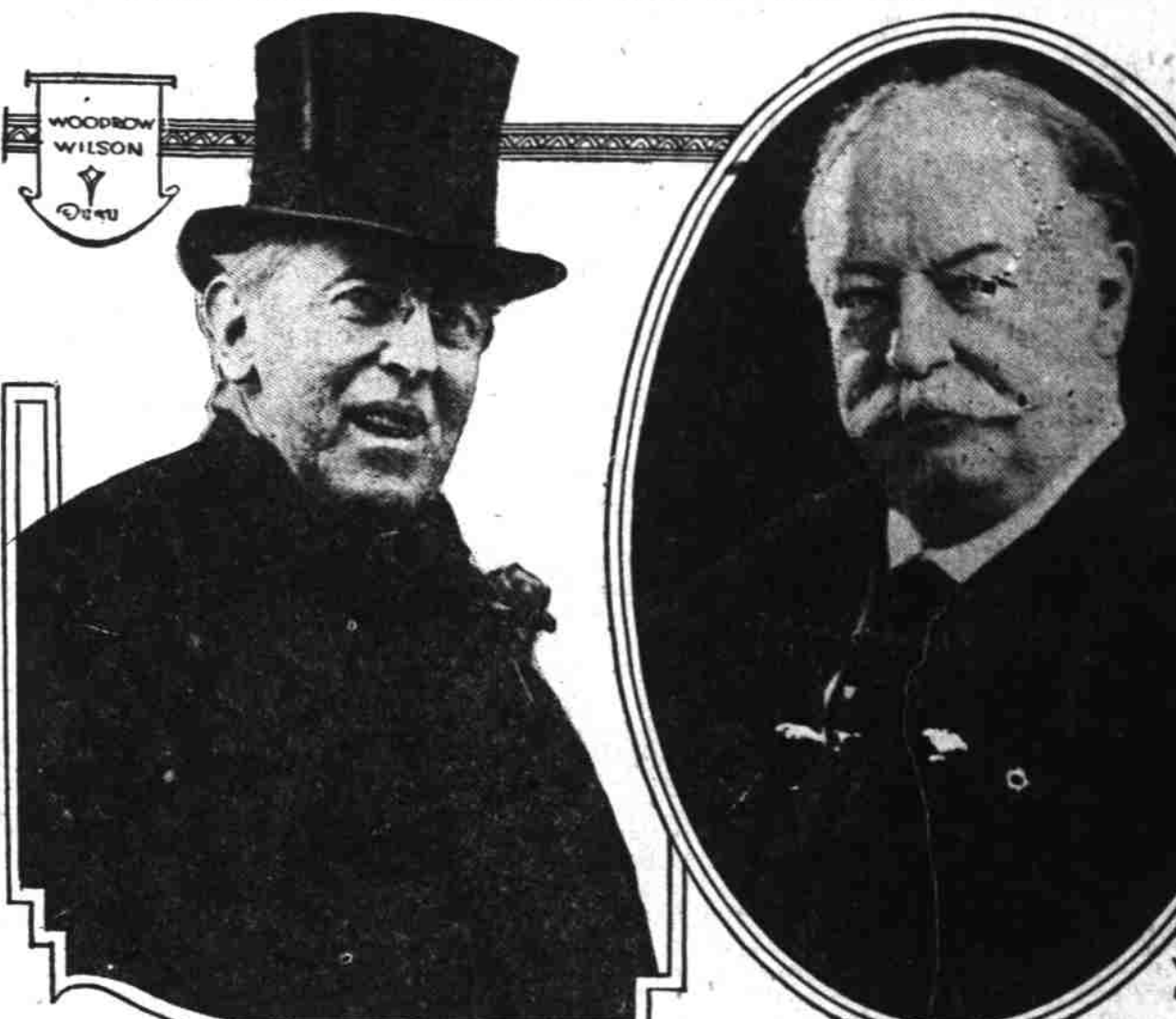

The public knows and hears a great deal about Mr. Taft, now Chief Justice of the United States. It sees and hears little about Mr. Wilson and probably, therefore, he excites the public interest more.
