WILLS VICTOR BY KNOCKOUT

Tut Jackson of Ohio Has No Chance Against New Orleans Heavyweight

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Harry Wills, New Orleans heavyweight, tonight knocked out "Tut" Jackson of Washington Courthouse, Ohio, after two minutes and five seconds of fighting in the third round of their scheduled 15-round match at Ebbetts field, Brooklyn.

A hard swinging right to the kidney sent Jackson to the canvas. He tried hard at the count of eight to rise, then fell on his face and was carried to his corner by Wills. Jackson had not landed more than three hard punches in the contest, while the New Orleans man had pounded him on his head and body continually.

First Time K. O. Gets Him. It was the first time that Jackson in his short pugilistic career has been knocked out. Jackson became known after knocking out some 40 odd lesser lights in the

heavy division. Most notable of those knocked out was Sam Langford, the "Boston Tarbaby," who several years ago was one of the leading heavyweights of the world. Jackson showed little of pugilistic prowess against Wills.

Wills towered several inches above the Ohioan and outweighed him by 25 pounds. Wills showed strength in his punching. Jackson was badly hurt by body blows and quickly weakened.

Round 1.—Wills landed several heavy body punches and Jackson smiled broadly at him. Wills pounded Jackson's head with heavy rights. Jackson's swings went wild. Jackson was hurt by a hard left to stomach and left to jaw. He fought back. Jackson went down with a heavy right to stomach but was up at the count of eight.

Round 2.—They talked a lot and grinned at each other after exchanging hard rights to the body. Wills was warned against heading. Wills staggered Jackson with lefts and rights to head, and the bell again found Jackson smiling.

Ohioan Takes Count. Round 3.—They were in a series of clinches, neither punching effectively.

Round 4.—Jackson went down from a hard right to the stomach. Wills wins by knockout.

TENNIS TITLE STAYS IN U. S.

Tilden and Richards Turn Back Invaders and Championship Stays

BOSTON, Aug. 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—The National championship in lawn tennis doubles remains in the United States. The Australian invasion which has as its triple object the Davis cup, the doubles title and the singles championship was defeated in its secondary phase when W. T. Tilden II and Vincent Richards, playing through tillists, turned back Gerald L. Patterson and Pat O'Hara Wood, antipodean stars, after losing the first set. The scores were: 4-6, 6-1, 6-3, 6-4.

The match had a double significance because of its bearing on the doubles play in the forthcoming Davis cup tournament for which the contenders of today have been regarded as the probable nominees, was marked by the irresistible team effort of the Americans following their opening setback.

Kimball and Willamette Will Open on Same Date

AUTHORITY TO CONTROL LINES IS PROBABLE

ed or of permitting the public to be "plundered."

The senate committee approved an amendment to the bill which would limit the authority of the controlling commission to one year.

Agency Idea Abandoned. The house interstate commerce committee in reporting the Winslow bill for federal coal control, announced that the proposal for a federal fuel agency had been definitely abandoned and that "the president is in accord with this conclusion."

Despite this action, however, Representative Anderson, Republican, Minnesota, announced tonight that he had prepared an amendment by which the President would be authorized to take over the coal mines, if necessary to obtain an adequate supply of fuel and to create a national agency for buying from the mines and selling direct to the consumer.

Debate Not Concluded. Some leaders declared tonight that both the Johnson and Anderson amendments probably would be thrown out on points of order as not being germane to the bill itself.

The six hours of general debate on the bill had not been concluded when the house adjourned to-

night. The measure will be taken up tomorrow for consideration item by item, and leaders said they would press for a vote tomorrow night.

Warm support was given the bill during the debate today as an administration measure and as affording a means of preventing profiteering in a public necessity. It was opposed by Republicans and Democrats who contended that, while it might deal with a profiteering operator, it offered no protection to the consumer against the dealer.

Bill Held Too Narrow. Representative Jou, Democrat, North Carolina, declared the bill would not cover the situation and added that congress should proceed at once to give the president authority to take over mines and railroads that great suffering during the winter might be obviated.

Representative Mondell, Wyoming, the Republican leader, told the house he would not vote for the bill, "with great enthusiasm, but with the hope that it would curb profiteering."

Mondell Not Sanguine. "I do not share the expectation of those who believe legislation of this character will wholly perform its expected purpose," said Mr. Mondell, who criticized price fixing during the war and asserted its effect had been to increase rather than to decrease prices.

Notice was served "upon the gentlemen from New England and the east" by Representative Bland, Republican, Indiana, that if the bill were enacted to give them coal, it would be followed by legislation to regulate the price of shoes and other manufactured articles produced by their states. Mr. Bland insisted that if such measures were taken to regulate the price of coal they should also be followed to regulate "the price of hogs for the farmers."

"When I reached the Cline house," Miss Thornton said, Mr. Bergen was already there.

Shot Is Heard. "Mr. Cline said to Bergen after I had repeated what I had told him, 'Now are you satisfied?' Mr. Bergen shrugged his shoulders and said something indifferent and slighting. Mr. Cline and Mr. Bergen went up stairs.

"A moment later I heard a scuffle on the stairs and then a shot. We ran to the door and Mr. Bergen came stumbling down stairs and ran out of the front door."

Turlo said he reached the house soon after 9 o'clock and heard sounds of quarreling inside. He said he walked in on Cline, who was starting up the stairs prodding Bergen ahead of him with the muzzle of a pistol.

Mrs. Cline Screaming. Mrs. Cline, he said, was screaming:

"Some one do something, for God's sake. Make peace between them."

Then there was a shot and Bergen came down with his hand over his chest, gasping, and ran out.

Wife Tells Version. Mrs. Mary Cline, wife of the slayer and the cause of the shooting, told her story of the tragedy tonight for the first time.

"Jack Bergen told the truth just before they went up stairs that night," she said. "After my husband had accused him of having maltreated me, he threw his coat back as if to bare his chest and shouted: 'I know I am a dirty rat; I know I'm no good; I'm a rotten friend; I'm a rat.' Then he said: 'All right, I'll fight you.' That was when they went up stairs. Down in the reception room we heard them struggling. Miss Thornton knows that and she'll have to tell the truth.

"She knows, too, that Jack Bergen made a peaceful settlement of the trouble impossible when he sneered out an unprintable name at me after admitting my husband's charges."

POSSIBLE VIOLATION OF LAW SIFTED

cept in the case of the locomotives put out of service. It was,

however, impossible, the commission said, for its inspection staff to report on the changing conditions of the 70,000 locomotives which come in service where safety requirements are established in the law.

The decision of the government to relax markedly and immediately the control on coal shipments was carried into effect by an interstate commerce commission order greatly modifying priority requirements hitherto imposed on consumers. Hereafter, upon special designation by the commission and its agents, coal will be shipped first to sections of the northwest whose supply ordinarily moves by the Great Lakes water, routes, and to railroads

whose needs are pressing to maintain transportation.

Administrators Report Needs. A second class of shipments will be maintained as entitled to priority when certificates of state fuel administrators or committees are furnished railroads. That the coal is meant for the public utilities, public institutions, domestic and buildings heating of supply of common carriers. The Great Lakes movement of coal will be also continued in priority status in this class, supplementary to the special orders which it was indicated would issue to insure this supply.

Secretary Hoover, who has guided the voluntary coal distribution, met today with the mem-

bers of the temporary administration, assisting to wind up its affairs. Estimates were made at the session that 25,000 cars of bituminous coal had been produced yesterday, which, at the average loading, amounts to 1,500,000 tons or a production rate considerably in excess of that maintained last year.

The government now estimated that 90 per cent of the bituminous mines are in operation or resuming operation.

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
