"Now, I was all wrong, same as you are, and thought that all cops were plumb bad, that shootin' one didn't go too far—to now think such thoughts makes me mad. For I've gone and been made fully over, just how and by whom I don't know; it seems that my old self's a rover, gone somewhere it shan't ever show."

"And it's all happened just

through believin' that wrong will be wrong for all time and that shootin' and theft and deceivin' summed up, they ain't worth a plugged dime. Whereas leadin' the straight although narrow, to the things that are really worth while, is like fakin' your soul with a harrow and deceiv' givin' way to a smile.
