## JACK DEMPSEY IN NEW YORK

### Bout With Harry Wills in Doubt Because of Stringent Conditions

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—With the arrival from the west today of Jack Dempsey, heavyweight boxing champion, stringent conditions for the first pending title contest between Dempsey and Harry Wills, negro challenger, should it be held in New York state, were laid down by William Muldoon, chairman of the state athletic commission.

Mr. Muldoon stipulated that any promoter authorized to stage the contest must make arrangements to seat comfortably not less than 100,000 persons, provide admission for 40,000 at not more than \$2 each, and place with the committee a security of \$250,000.

**Bout May Not Go**  
Opinion in boxing circles tonight was that the conditions might make it impossible to hold the bout in New York.

Asked to comment on this, Mr. Muldoon said: "I am not concerned with that possibility. I want the rights of the public safeguarded, and with that in mind, I think the conditions, such as I have outlined them are justified."

**Future at Stake**  
"On the outcome of the Dempsey-Wills bout, if held in New York," he continued, "the future of the boxing game rests, not only in this state, but in every state where boxing is countenanced. If pugilism is given a black eye here and the game is killed in the leading state, it will not live long elsewhere."

No bonafide offer has yet been made for the Dempsey-Wills match.

## STONE LAID AT NEW HOME

Impressive Services Held Yesterday at Old People's Institution Here

Fully 500 people attended the services for laying the cornerstone of the new \$55,000 Old People's home at Center and Sixteenth streets Wednesday at 3:30 p.m. It was not a beginning ceremony, but well on towards a finish, for the building is already up to putting on the rafters for the second floor over part of the structure. A blank in the wall had been left for the stone to be inserted, and this was the ceremony.

### Bishop Main Speaker

Dr. E. E. Gbert, Salem district superintendent of the Methodist church, presided. Dr. R. N. Avison, for 10 years a member of the board of trustees of the Home, spoke briefly of the institution, and his delightful years of association with both the governing board and the guests in the home.
