Gardner Motor Company Shows Steady Advance

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 23.—An authoritative report recently released shows the Gardner Motor Company, St. Louis with sales figures among the leaders of the automotive industry.

In units of production, among approximately 90 passenger car

manufacturers, this company ranked 17th in June and 16th in July.

The Gardner Motor company passed many of the larger and prominent automobile manufacturers, a feat that merits notice because of the increasing demand for the popular priced Gardner—actual closed car orders calling for over 50 per cent of their total output on all models—shows a

remarkable business revival during a period usually stagnant in automobile sales.

Lumber Mill Production 8 Per Cent Over Normal

One hundred and twenty-two mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending September 16, manufactured 89,374,992 feet of lumber; sold 70,838,097 feet; shipped 76,365,196 feet.

Production for reporting mills was 8 per cent above normal. New business taken during the week was 21 per cent below production. Shipments were 8 per cent above new business.

Thirty-nine per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 27,278,097 feet, of which 18,689,392 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 8,588,705 feet for overseas shipment. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 1452 cars.

Thirty-eight per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 29,205,196 feet, of which 21,553,592 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal, and 7,651,604 feet export. Rail shipments amounted to 1572 cars.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders total 105,033,448 feet. Unfilled export orders 63,245,029 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 6853 cars. In 37 weeks production has been 3,007,209,343 feet; new business 2,961,634,084 feet; shipments 2,923,630,588 feet.

CLUB WORKERS MAY SAIL SEA

Unusual Inducements Made for Entrance Into State and County Fairs

Girls of Oregon who are identified with industrial club work are putting forth special efforts this fall to make their displays at the various county and state fairs notable, for aside from the usual cash prizes and trips to Oregon agricultural college offered at the state fair, there is held out the possibility of a European trip to those who stand the elimination which follows at the Pacific-International Livestock exposition in Portland this fall.

All Expenses Paid
A three month's trip to Europe for four country girls, with all expenses paid, is the prize offered for winning members of canning teams of the United States, the American committee on Devastated France providing the trip, for which 55,000 girls the country over are expected to compete this fall.

The first and second highest scoring teams at each expositional contest will compete for national honors during the week of the International Livestock exposition in Chicago, December 2, to 9.

Fine Work Done
The local clubs of Marion and Polk county are doing their best

work in years, in all branches of work, with girls and boys both, demonstrating special interest in livestock.

Miss Bessie Bloom, a 15 year-old girl, of Silverton, will come back to the state fair again this year, entering in both the industrial club exhibits and open es. This young girl, who specializes in Poland China hogs, has first in the pig club and open classes for four years successively, and has been a member of the summer course at O. A. C. for three years. She has been successful in carrying off prizes over her father's entries in the Poland China class, and last year secured honors at the Pacific International Livestock exposition.

Is Member of Big Club
As well as her sister Emaline, who is also a most successful exhibitor, she is a member of the Coolidge-McCaine Pig club of Silverton.

M. G. Gunderson, president of the Coolidge & McCaine bank, is at the head of this club, and is vitally interested in pure-bred livestock. There are 15 active members in the pig club, and six in a Jersey calf club.

Homer Bray, 16, of near Salem, won the cup in the Marion county judging team at the state fair last year, and also at the livestock exposition in Portland. He is on the team again this year. Last year he went in for Poland China hogs, but this year he has switched to Chester Whites, and is expected to make a very creditable showing.

Scrub Pig Was Start
Glen Mathis is another Marion county boy who will prove a formidable contestant. Here is a young boy who started out with only a scrub pig, and who has won his honors after facing many things that would have discouraged a youngster of lesser metal.

Through the years when he was building up his pen, he, like all the other boys and girls of Marion county, had the encouragement and moral support of W. H. Baillie, rural school supervisor of Marion county.

Personal Attention Given
Mr. Baillie keeps in close touch with the various local leaders throughout the county and has been bending every effort to make a good showing at the forthcoming state fair. Stayton will be represented by sewing, poultry, cooking, pig and canning clubs.

North Howell has five standard clubs, which held meetings all summer, with any member black-balled who did not show active interest. The Aumsville club is another live club, doing fine work. Altogether there are 33 standard clubs in Marion county, besides many individuals who are doing excellent work, although they are in places too remote to have the aid of fellow workers and club leaders.

Survey Made Recently
A recent survey of the activities of the boys and girls in Polk county showed equal interest, with all club members making good progress in the various projects. This county's exhibit at the state fair will be exceptionally large this year, and will be of broader scope. Many sewing clubs have been organized, with members meeting at the homes during the summer months. All are under the supervision of competent leaders.

Three young boys, Alfred, Geo. and Woodrow Wilson, who live near Sheridan, are entering energetically into the raising of potatoes and gardening. Last year one of these boys won first prize at the state fair on potatoes and gardening, and all are expected

to carry off honors this year at the big annual event.

Poultry Attracts Many
Many boys and girls of the county have been going in for poultry, and in consequence, it is anticipated that any one who competes with them will have to

show something that is very excellent indeed.

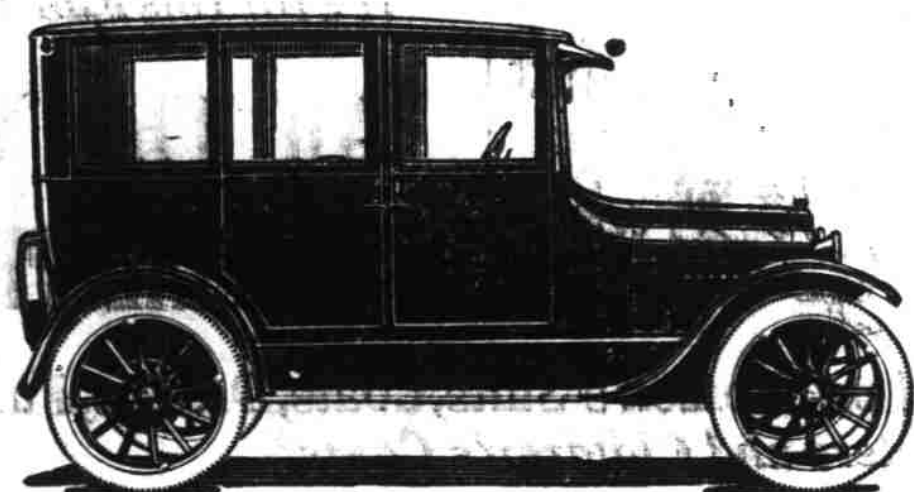
